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Immigrants offsetting population decline

More deaths and fewer births in 2020 have aggravated the natural balance of the Portuguese population however immigration has helped to boost numbers.

ccording to the National Statistics Institute (INE), which registered 84,426 live births in 2020, 2.5 percent less than in 2019, the Portuguese population ended up increasing slightly (0.02 percent), as a result

of a positive migration balance. The average age of mothers giving birth to a child was 31.6 years (31.4 in 2019). The average age for the birth of the first child increased from 29.9 years to 30.2 years. In total, 123,358 people died last year (10.3 percent more than in

2019). Among the deaths, there were 205 children (41 fewer). "The infant mortality rate decreased to 2.4 deaths per thousand live births (2.8 percent in 2019)", stated the INE.

In 2020, 18,902 marriages took place, representing a drop of 43.2

percent compared to the previous year, while 17,295 divorces were decreed, a decrease of 15.3 percent compared to 2019 (20,421).

Positive migration

Data compiled by INE also revealed that, for the fourth consecutive year, the number of permanent immigrants (67,160) surpassed that of permanent emigrants (25,886), which corresponds to a positive migratory balance of 41,274. Due to the positive migration balance, "which managed to offset the negative natural balance", the resident population in Portugal increased in 2020, recording an effective growth rate of 0.02 percent.

In 2020, 59,817 foreigners acquired Portuguese nationality, "a number that almost doubled compared to 2019 (30.469)", highlighted INE. Thus, the resident population in Portugal increased for the second consecutive year. In 2019, the effective growth rate had been 0.19 percent.

"The population increase recorded in 2020 (+2,343 people than in 2019) resulted from the positive migration balance of 41,274, although lower than in 2019 (44,506), having offset the negative natural balance of -38,931 (-25,214 in 2019)", concluded the

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Return of the mask?



As rates of Covid-19 infections rise in Portugal, and politicians and specialists meet to discuss the situation, calls to reinstate mandatory mask wearing increase.

nitially, the Portuguese Pulmonary Federation made the call to bring back mask use in public, even in outdoor settings, and then the President of the Republic also stated that the return of masks should be resumed. Speaking to journalists at Teatro Municipal São Luiz, in Lisbon, when asked about measures to be adopted in Portugal given the growth in the number of cases and deaths by Covid-19 in Portugal, Marcelo Rebelo de Sousa considered that one should "wait for the meeting of the Infarmed" with experts, which is scheduled for 19 November.

Asked, later, if he understands that the mandatory use of masks in the street will be resumed, the head of state replied: "That, of course, is evident". While detailing the number of Covid-19 cases currently compared to the same period last year, the President called for calm. "Let's consider it calmly. We have a vaccination that we didn't have. And we will act accordingly," he said.

Remote working

The Portuguese Pulmonary Federation has called for the return of the mandatory use of masks in all indoor public spaces and also a return to remote working. In a letter to the Minister of Health and the General Directorate of Health (DGS), the federation considers that the epidemiological situation of Covid-19 "is again a source of concern", noting that the Transmissibility index (Rt) remains above 1. "In our opinion these measures should have already been adopted. Just look at the daily situation report that has been released and see how the Rt has been rising for four weeks and for two weeks it has always been above 1", said the vice president of the Portuguese Pulmonary Federation (FPP), Jaime Pina.

Pina warned that cases will continue to grow and that the risk matrix "is already in the red again".

"These graphs show that the Covid-19 situation in Portugal is deteriorating and will continue for at least another two weeks. At this point, measures should be applied", he defended. To reverse the growth of the pandemic in Portugal, the FPP asks the Government and the DGS to make the use of face masks mandatory again,



not only in public spaces indoors, but also outdoors, when adequate distance cannot be guaranteed.

Vaccines

The federation also advocates speeding up the current process of boosting vaccination (3rd dose) to groups that have already been selected (immunocompromised patients and people over 65 years old), extending this reinforcement to all health professionals and that the administration of

the second dose of vaccine to those who already had Covid-19 be accelerated. "The fact that we have had a huge success in the vaccination campaign will not prevent an increase in more serious cases, which imply more hospitalisations, greater use of intensive care and a higher mortality rate", says the letter, stressing the urgent need for measures to halt the pandemic's progression.

The FPP also defends that "public recommendations

on the importance of other measures of individual protection: social distancing and hand washing and disinfection" should be renewed. Speaking to Lusa, Jaime Pina gave the example of the football game between Portugal and Serbia, on 14 November, with more than 60,000 people at the Estádio da Luz: "Everyone was without a mask. Even in open space, people are side by side and without a mask".

"It is one of the examples

of the places where the use of masks should be made mandatory again. It's taking two steps back and then being able to take a step forward," he added. Prime minister, António Costa, has called for Friday, 19 November, at 3pm, a new meeting of politicians and specialists at Infarmed's auditorium in Lisbon, regarding the situation of Covid-19 in Portugal. The last time one of these meetings took place was two months ago, on 16 September.



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Portugal welcomes 210 more Afghan refugees

Another 210 Afghan refugees arrived in Lisbon on 16 November, joining the 266 who have been in Portugal since the beginning of the withdrawal process from Afghanistan, in mid-August.



ccording to the
Portuguese Secretary
of State for
Foreign Affairs and
Cooperation, Francisco André,
the 210 refugees, all of Afghan
nationality, arrived in a group that
includes a large number of women
and children.

In total, Francisco André noted, Portugal has already hosted 476 Afghan refugees, mainly people who collaborated with the Portuguese military forces, with those from the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO) or with those from the United Nations in Afghanistan, as well as family members of some who are already in Portuguese territory. The group also includes those whom Francisco André considered "vulnerable" to the Taliban regime, which took power in Kabul in August, such as human rights activists, women, girls, judges, jurists, journalists and

even some family members of the Afghan women's football team who are already in Portugal.

"With the arrival of 266 Afghan refugees, the commitment that Portugal assumed in response to the international appeal to receive refugees from Afghanistan is almost complete", Francisco André told Lusa. Francisco André indicated that everyone is in good health and that there is only one woman who is in the final stage of her pregnancy, so she is being monitored by the health authorities. At Lisbon airport, the refugees were received by the High Commissioner for Migration, Sónia Pereira, and will be sent, for now, to various support centres in Portugal, so that they can then be divided according to the interests of each one, especially in the case of family members. The Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs and Cooperation said that Portugal does not have a defined

number of refugees to take in, indicating, however, that in the coming weeks, "another significant number" of others should arrive, but without giving any further details. "We continue to work in this direction, to get Afghans out of the country. We have now reached almost five hundred and we are try-

ing to adapt our reception capacity

Francisco André, stressing that the

to respond to any needs", added

entire process must be done with "discretion and security".

"With this, while not complete, the process of withdrawing almost all the Afghan citizens who worked with our forces [in Afghanistan] and their families is practically complete. This was one of the priorities assumed by Portugal in mid-August. But there is still a very small number of people to reach Portugal. The vast majority are already in Portugal", he concluded.



Pollution kills 4,900 people in Portugal

Pollution caused the early deaths of 4,900 people in Portugal in 2019. The European Environment Agency (EEA) estimates that in 2019, air pollution caused the premature death of 364,200 people across the European Union, despite indicating that over recent years early deaths due to air pollution have been dropping.

44,000 elderly living alone

GNR officers have flagged over 44,000 elderly people throughout Portugal living alone, isolated or in vulnerable situations. Some 3,500 of those are in the Algarve. This was found in Operation Senior Census 2021, which has been carried out yearly by the GNR since 2011

Action against Portugal for bad air quality

The European Commission has announced it will be filing action against Portugal in the European Union Court of Justice due to poor air quality caused by high levels of nitrogen dioxide. Air pollution caused by nitrogen dioxide mainly results from road traffic. In a statement the EC said "Portugal has recorded continuous and persistent exceedance of the yearly limit value for nitrogen dioxide in three air quality zones: North Lisbon, Coastal Porto, and between the Douro and Minho".

High risk of corruption in defence

Portugal has been ranked among countries with a high risk of corruption in the Defence sector, despite having registered some improvements compared to 2015. This was revealed in an assessment by Transparency International (TI). In the assessment of 86 countries, Portugal totalled 44 points out of a possible 100, which is below the European average (59/100).

Car production rises

Car production grew in October to 35,152 vehicles according to the Portuguese Automobile Association ACAP. Cars produced in Portugal last month were 8.2 percent up on the same month in 2020. Over 232,000 units have been produced since the beginning of the year; the vast majority were exported to foreign markets.

New partnership to teach sign language

A new partnership between the PSP police and national publisher Porto Editora aims to teach the population to communicate in sign language. PSP spokesperson Nuno Carocha said that since 2016, the PSP has trained 100 police officers in sign language. The announcement was made to mark National Day of Portuguese Sign Language.

More than 37,000 complaints about health facilities The Health Regulatory Authority (ERS)



ccording to a new report, from a total of 45,554 processes received by the ERS, 37,872 refer to complaints, 6,956 to praise and 499 to suggestions. More than 220 processes

have mixed classification.

Of the total number of cases submitted to the ERS, 69 percent refer to establishments providing healthcare in the public sector, including establishments managed under a The Health Regulatory Authority (ERS) received, during the first half of this year more than 37,000 complaints about public, private and social health units.

Public-Private Partnership (PPP) regime. Of the 37,872 complaints received in the first half of the year, more than 4,400 refer to the Regional Health Administration (ARS) of Lisbon and Vale do Tejo, 2,686 to ARS Norte and 2,443 to the University Hospital Center of Porto.

The Lisbon and Vale do Tejo ARS was also the entity receiving the highest number of compliments (894), followed by the University Hospital Center of Porto (712) and the Barreiro Montijo Hospital Center (429). The report shows that 20,760 of the processes received by the ERS are related to 107 public sector establishments with internment, which represent 45.6 percent of the total submitted processes.

In the document, the ERS emphasises that complaints about constraints related to the vaccination plan against Covid-19

contributed to the increase in the values for the months of May and June, compared to the same period of the previous year. In the private sector, 9,179 processes were submitted to the ERS concerning 93 private sector establishments with internment. The most targeted was Hospital da Luz (Lisbon), with a total of 1,257 cases (989 complaints and 252 compliments), followed by CUF Descobertas Hospital, with 938 (796 complaints and 120 compliments), and CUF Tejo Hospital, with 796 processes (665 complaints and 116 compliments). In the social sector, the establishment with internment with more processes received at ERS in the first half of the year was Hospital Santa Maria Porto, with 25 complaints. Also in the social sector, but without hospitalisation, the most targeted unit was O Vigilante - Amadora, with 13 complaints.

Foreign car theft network dismantled

One man has been arrested and five identified, in an investigation that has taken down a criminal network involved in the theft of foreign-registered vehicles.

"The Territorial Command of Viseu, through the Criminal Investigation Nucleus (NIC) of Viseu, has arrested a 69-year-old man for possessing prohibited weapons, and identified five, aged between 35 and 56 years old, as part of a process of the theft of vehicles with foreign registrations, in the centre and north of the country", announced the GNR in a statement.

These arrests took place as part of an investigation which had been underway since March and in which "it was possible to investigate the existence of a scheme originating in France and Switzerland, where vehicles are stolen, or reported as stolen".

The crime then saw the cars "transported to Portugal, where they were received and then dis-

mantled to be then sold in parts, or sold with other registrations, which constitute the crimes of qualified theft, insurance fraud, forgery and tax fraud".

During the investigation, the GNR carried out a total of "259 searches, seven house search warrants and 252 non-household searches, namely in workshops".

The searches took place in mu-

nicipalities in the districts of Viseu (São Pedro do Sul, Viseu, Mangualde and Sernancelhe); Guard (Seia); Aveiro (Vagos) and Braga (Vila Nova de Famalicão and Celorico de Basto) where various materials were also seized.

The list of seized material, according to the GNR, includes "14 vehicles with large cylinder capacity, two shotguns, 47 cartridges,

two extendible sticks and a pepper spray."

And also "several license plates associated with stolen vehicles, identification documents of stolen vehicles, punch sets for tampering with chassis numbers, three vehicle diagnostic machines, three mobile phones, eight catalytic converters and various computer equipment".



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Porto best English-speaking city



For the second time, Portugal is the seventh country in the world with the best English proficiency, with Porto standing out as the Portuguese city with the best level of English for non-natives.



his year the results of Portugal were better than the results of Sweden (8th), Finland (9th) and Croatia (10th), according to the EF English Proficiency Index (EF EPI) report - which analyses data from two million non-English speakers in 112 countries and regions.

In a ranking led by the Netherlands for the second consecutive year, Portugal is only behind Austria (2nd), Denmark (3rd), Singapore (4th),

Norway (5th) and Belgium (6th). In southern Europe the Portuguese are still the best English speakers, leaving behind Greece (19th), France (30th), Spain (33rd) and Italy (35th).

The 625 points achieved by the Portuguese is the best record ever for Portugal in this ranking, after two years ago the country moved into the group of countries with "high proficiency".

In addition Porto is, for the third year in row, the Portuguese city where the best English is spoken, Coimbra is in second and Lisbon occupies the third place.

On the opposite side of the ranking worldwide, in the last places are the Democratic Republic of Congo (110th), South Sudan (111th) and Yemen (112th).

"Despite the drop in the number of travellers around the world, English continues to make communication easier in addition to enabling new ways of working. This year's EF EPI is more distributed than ever, providing valuable information for governments to assess their language learning policies and highlight strategic areas for improvement," said Kate Bell, author of the EF English Proficiency Index.

"The EF EPI is based on the results of the EF Standard English Test (EF SET), the world's first free standardised English test. The EF SET has been used all over the world by schools, companies and governments for large-scale

testing", according to a note sent to **The Portugal News**.

Men better than women in English

In addition, for the first time, the study reveals that worldwide men speak English better than women. Except in Asia and Africa, where women are still better than men, all regions of the world follow the same trend: women's English remains the same as men's English improves. In Portugal, men managed to get a better classification than women. Even so, Portuguese women this year already have a great level of English with 621 points, a value higher than last year and well above the average for men around the world (508 points).

Regarding age groups, Portuguese young people between 21 and 25 years old continue to be the ones with best English skills according to the report (EPI) that shows the relationship between fluency in English and purchasing power, quality of life and innovation. However, in spite of this positive correlation between fluency in English and purchasing power, Portugal is one of the few countries with a "very high" level of English proficiency, but below the correlation line with purchasing power.

English at work

Globally, in most jobs, people have lower average levels of English than they would need to perform better in their jobs. According to the study, this means wasted time, lack of communication and ineffective knowledge sharing. On average, the three industries where English is spoken better are: consulting with a Moderate level of English spoken followed by Information Technology (Moderate) and Engineering (Moderate).

Then, consumer goods (Moderate), food (Low), logistics (Low), hospitality (Low), aviation (Low), retail (Low), construction (Low), pharmaceuticals (Low), telecommunications (Low), automotive (Low), mining and energy (Low), banking and finance (Low), electronic products (Low), chemicals (Low), manufacturing (Very Low), insurance (Very Low), and education (Very low). To end the list, also with a very low level are the health industry and the government sector. According to the note:

"Marketing professionals are usually those who speak English best, but do not go beyond a moderate level, the same happens with law, human resources and information technology".

With a very low level of English, there are usually professionals who work in the areas of Operations, Administration and Maintenance. "When professionals do not have the English necessary to evolve into new roles, their career development is compromised", concludes the report.



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
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Trains instead of planes for **Portuguese**



Portuguese are willing to swap short haul flights for trains, and

to introduce climate change taxes according to a new study.



he 2021-2022 EIB Climate Survey has revealed the concerns of Portuguese people relating to climate change and the

According to the survey conducted by the European Investment Bank (EIB): "The vast majority of the Portuguese population (77 percent) feel that climate change has an impact on their everyday

lives. This is a concern shared by both the younger (75 percent) and older generations (75 percent), dispelling myths that climate change is more of a concern for the young and a generationally divisive subject.

When it comes to regulation, the majority (85 percent) of Portuguese respondents favour stricter government measures that would impose changes on people's behaviour (15 points above the EU average of 70 percent).

Meanwhile, "only 5 percent of Portuguese people still believe that global warming is not due to human activities".

When asked about the source of energy their country should rely on to fight global warming, the survey found that the majority of "Portuguese people favour renewable energies (83 percent, 20 points above the EU average of

63 percent) to address the climate emergency". It was also found that Portuguese people are overall less supportive of nuclear energy than other Europeans (3 percent vs. 12 percent).

Popular solutions

Over three quarters of Portuguese people (77 percent) would support - and to a greater extent than Europeans in general (69 percent) – the introduction of a tax on products and services that contribute most to global warming. The survey continues to state that "Portuguese respondents are also in favour of a five-year minimum warranty on any electric or electronic product (95 percent) and replacing short-distance flights with fast, low-emission trains (91 percent). They also favour softer measures like strengthening education and increasing

youth awareness of sustainable consumption (96 percent)". EIB Vice-President Ricardo Mourinho Félix said: "91 percent of Portuguese respondents say they want to replace short-distance flights by fast trains. The expansion of the Trans-European Transport and Energy Networks (TENs) remains one of our key objectives, as they increase the potential to generate trade, foster economic growth, boost competitiveness, while reducing pollution. That is why, for example, we financed highspeed trains connecting Portugal and Spain, facilitating interoperable and efficient freight connections to and from the south of Portugal. "We must crowd in resources from the private sector and invest in new disruptive technologies to achieve the climate goals we have set. It's now or never - this is the critical decade to act."

Marcelo welcomes "small steps"

The Portuguese President of the Republic, Marcelo Rebelo de Sousa has welcomed the "small steps" taken at the climate summit in Glasgow (COP26), while regretting that "a more ambitious consensus was not possible".

"While regretting that a more ambitious consensus was not possible, particularly with regard to fossil fuels, the reduction of emissions, the deadlines to achieve the limited goals under discussion, the financial support for less developed countries, to adapt to the changes that are there and mitigate the effects for their peoples, the President of the Republic welcomes the small steps taken by COP26 in Glasgow, which still represents a timid advance in

the fight against climate change", reads a statement released on the official website of the Presidency of the Portuguese Republic.

The 26th Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (COP26) formally adopted a final declaration with a last-minute amendment proposed by India that softens the call to end the use of coal.

The change was proposed by the Indian

Environment Minister, Bhupender Yadav, who, at the closing plenary of COP26 asked to change the wording of a paragraph defending the progressive end of the use of coal for energy production without measures to reduce emissions.

The proposal ended up being approved by the president of the summit, Alok Sharma, who said that he "deeply regretted the way this process took place".

The final approved document, which will

become known as the Glasgow Climate Pact, preserves the ambition of the Paris Agreement, reached in 2015, to contain the increase in global temperature by 1.5°C above the average levels of the pre-indus-

UN Secretary General António Guterres commented on the agreement reached in Glasgow warning that despite "welcome steps forward, the climate catastrophe continues to knock at the door".













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Violence against women in childbirth

Mistreatment, perineum stitches, humiliation, high levels of unnecessary episiotomies and caesareans without the women's consent, are some of the claims being made regarding violence against women in childbirth.





My childbirth shouldn't be the worst memory I have in my life" is one of the phrases read on the posters

that several women took to the demonstration on 6 November against the opinion of the Medical Association which said that





exist in Portugal. After all the complaints in this regard, "nobody expected an opinion of this nature from the Medical Association. They completely ignored the numbers," said Carla Santos, one of the spokespersons for the Obstetric Violence movement behind the protest. According to her, going to a protest like this means, for many of these women, two things: fear and sadness. "Some had to relive their traumatic moments, which made some cry at the protest – it was very emotional. Furthermore, there were health professionals who said they did not come for fear of retaliation". If, on the one hand, Portugal

has a low mortality rate for both pregnant women and newborn children, revealing good medical care, on the other hand, it has high rates of unnecessary caesarean sections and episiotomies.

What does Obstetric Violence consists of?

If this term is unfamiliar to you, Obstetric Violence occurs whenever a person in labour or childbirth suffers abuse or disrespect of their rights, including physical, sexual or verbal abuse, intimidation, humiliation, and aggression by the medical team, namely doctors and nurses. It may include being forced into procedures without informed consent such as improper or excessive vaginal touching, forced caesarean sections, perineum stitches, sexual assault during exams or procedures, induction of labour, episiotomy without medical reasons and being treated with disrespect.

Suffering in the expat community

Sara do Vale, founder of the Portuguese Association for Women's Rights in Pregnancy and Childbirth, which, since 2014, has been fighting obstetric violence and helping women, told The Portugal News that obstetric violence is a reality that does not only affect Portuguese women, having a very strong impact on the foreign community. Sara do Vale is also a doula in Lisbon and, as 70 percent of her clients are foreigners, she is very aware of the reality. "Beyond the language barrier, understanding how the system works in Portugal is not always easy, especially when it comes to women who come from northern European countries where, in general, they are much more aligned with the

WHO recommendations, with midwives caring for low-risk births and an idea that childbirth is more physiological. And when they arrive in Portugal in a system where the obstetrician is at the top of the pyramid, it can be difficult to understand and even to accept", said Sara do Vale.

A problem that with the pandemic got even worse. "Unfortunately, the pandemic brought many restrictions that are taking a long time to be eased, for example, the right to have a birth partner, which is a very important part of the female birth experience. It's important to realise that a woman's birth experience will stay with her for a lifetime."

Obstetric violence also hits men

Although women are the main victims, men also suffer from obstetric violence, something that was seen during the demonstration by the number of men who were there to support the cause. "Men also suffer from it, they see the person they love being humiliated and mistreated, they are prevented from entering and it hurts to see the baby born in this context," said Cláudia

Furthermore: "In the labour room, they are often treated as if they had some kind of cognitive impairment or if they were children. They heard comments like "look, this is not good for you, it is not good for your intimate life because you will never

see her the same way again".

Options for a humanised birth

In fact, according to Cláudia, there aren't many options for those couples who want something different for childbirth. In Portugal there are no birth centres and midwives are almost a thing of the past. Childbirths are mainly performed in hospitals, including low-risk pregnancies.

When I asked why, Cláudia

explained that: "The medical association was indirectly restricting birth centres as an option for women, as it is forbidden for doctors to carry out water births and home births, indeed the obstetricians were told that they would undergo a disciplinary procedure and may lose their professional licenses. And to set up a birth centre they need an obstetrician to be clinically responsible. So, if doctors are banned by their professional association then birth centres cannot exist in Portugal". However, for couples looking for more support at this stage of their life, Doula Sara recommends making a birth plan, finding a doula, and making all possible arrangements. Furthermore, the Pregnancy and Childbirth Association is available to support you, including in English, by phone or email, on what to expect from the Portuguese NHS.

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Date announced for the end of SEF

The dissolution of SEF has been officially announced in the Diário da República, with the Government now having 60 days to transfer police powers to the PSP, GNR and PJ and to create the Portuguese Agency for Migration and Asylum.

overnment now has until 11 January, 2022 to carry out transfers of attributions in administrative and internal

security matters

The diploma determines that the current administrative attributions of SEF in relation to foreign citizens are now carried out by the Portuguese Agency for Migration and Asylum (APMA) and by the Institute of Registries and Notaries (IRN).

According to the law, the Government must present, within 60 days, the diploma that creates the APMA, an administrative service with specific attributions.

The APMA will have the "mission of implementing public policies on migration and asylum, namely the regularisation of the entry and stay of foreign citizens in national territory, issuing opinions on applications for visas, asylum and refugee settlement".

asylum and refugee settlement". The law also establishes that until the entry into force of the diploma creating the APMA "the rules governing SEF's computer and communications systems are maintained in force, including those relating to the National part of the Schengen Information System and others existing in the scope control of the movement of people, its management being ensured by an

Information Security Technology unit". The diploma also determines the creation, with APMA, of a consultative body on migration and asylum matters, which ensures the representation of government departments and non-governmental organisations, "whose statutory object is primarily intended to defend the rights of migrants, refugees and asylum seekers, for the defense of human rights or the fight against racism and xenophobia, being responsible for issuing opinions, recommendations and suggestions that are submitted to them".

Transferring responsibilities

The transfer of competences to the IRN, which will also be responsible for foreign citizens holding a residence permit in Portugal and issuing passports, will be defined in a specific diploma to be approved by the Government. Within the scope of the transfer of police powers, the GNR will be responsible for "overseeing, inspecting and controlling the maritime and land borders", "acting in the context of coercive removal proceedings and the judicial expulsion of foreign citizens, in the areas of its jurisdiction" and "ensure the carrying out of mobile controls and joint operations with national security forces and services and Spanish counterparts".



In turn, the PSP will integrate the competences of "overseeing, inspecting and controlling airport borders and cruise terminals" and "acting within the scope of coercive removal processes and judicial expulsion of foreign citizens, in the areas of its jurisdiction".

The PJ has reserved powers in the investigation of crimes of aid to illegal immigration, association of aid to illegal

immigration, human trafficking and others related to these.

This separation of SEF between police functions and administrative functions related to immigrants was foreseen in the Government's programme and was announced by the Minister of Internal Administration after the death of a Ukrainian citizen at SEF premises at Lisbon airport, for which three inspectors were condemned.

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End in sight for EN125 works?

Works to complete the upgrading of the EN125 road in the Algarve may finally be concluded following a government resolution.



he Portuguese Parliament has approved the final text presented by the Committee on Economy, Innovation, Public Works and

Housing on the draft resolutions of the BE, PCP and PS parties regarding the Estrada Nacional (EN) 125, in the Algarye.

At issue was a draft resolution by the BE party, recommending the Government 'promote the cohesion of the Algarve" through the rescue of the concession and requalification of the sections of the EN125 specifically "between Olhão and Vila Real de Santo António", with the conclusion of the works being "a matter of urgency". In the final text approved by all parliamentary groups, except the Liberal Initiative, it is recommended that the Government "proceed with the rapid completion of the EN125 rehabilitation works, including bypasses, access roads and connections provided for in the initial project, in particular, along the Olhão/Vila Real de Santo António section, regardless of the continuity of the legal process in progress".

The executive is also asked, "for reasons of public interest and promotion of cohesion in the Algarve, to urgently develop the necessary procedures to rescue the Algarve Litoral sub-concession", reads the document published on the Parliament's website.

"In the spirit of the decentralisation

process and in strengthening the role of the regions, for a closer involvement of municipalities, the evaluation of the monitoring, management and maintenance of the EN125, as well as in the future, the A22, needs to be made, thus allowing municipalities to take an active part in the definition of mobility policies to meet the needs of the Algarve".

The requalification of the EN125 was launched under a Public Private Partnership (PPP) in 2009, during the PS government led by José Sócrates and was later revised during the PSD/CDS-PP coalition executive, led by Pedro Passos Coelho.

The government of Passos Coelho ended up withdrawing from the scope of the Algarve Litoral (RAL) sub-concession the sections between Olhão and Vila Real de Santo António, transferring them to Infraestruturas de Portugal.

This solution was challenged in court by RAL, which saw an arbitration court agrees

RAL, which saw an arbitration court agree with it, but Infraestruturas de Portugal appealed, and the decision of the higher court is now awaiting.

Algarve medicinal cannabis farm

A company based in Castro Marim has begun cultivating cannabis for medicinal purposes and plans to produce 20 tonnes a year.

According to João Nascimento, the company started work three years ago and expects, as of the first quarter of 2022, to start working in a factory in Vila Real de Santo António that will later allow the plant to be transformed for the production of oils and cannabis preparations for medicinal purposes.

After three years dedicated to bureaucracy and the construction of basic infrastructure, the company obtained a license in August this year and began to cultivate the plant in the municipality of Faro, said the executive director of Cannprisma.

"We are fine-tuning our cultivation process and our goal

is, by the end of this year, to start selling to the foreign market," he said, adding that in 2022 the company will start "production" in the factory.

"Next year, our forecast is that we will have the capacity to reach 20 tonnes per year and our invoicing forecast will be around €30 to €50 million per year". Currently, the company has around 50 employees, but the goal is to be able to reach 300 when the process is completed, he stressed.

Asked about choosing the Algarve to install the plant's cultivation and treatment unit, João Nascimento replied that the region is "a great place to live",

but also has "excellent conditions" for "the cannabis plant".

Among the advantages are "good weather conditions" and "number of hours of sunshine per year", a characteristic that is "very important" because it "directly affects the quantity of production" and "the quality of the flower itself", he considered.















Tourism income already topping 2020 levels

Income from tourist accommodation grew 33.3 percent from January to September, to €1,629,900 million, surpassing the value registered for the whole of 2020.

According to the National Statistics Institute (INE): "In the first nine months of the year, income grew by 33.3 percent in total and 35.3 percent relative to the accommodation", to a total of €1,629,900 and €1,244,700 million, respectively.

However, when compared to the same period in 2019, before the Covid-19 pandemic, total income decreased by 53 percent and income from accommodation decreased by 52.7 percent.

The Algarve concentrated 36 percent of total income and 36.1 percent of income from accommodation in September, followed by the Lisbon Metropolitan Area (20.2 percent and 21.1 percent, in the same order) and the North (13.6 percent and 13.9 percent, respectively).

In tourist accommodation establishments as a whole, the

average income per available room (RevPAR) stood at €47.9 in September, having increased by 58.2 percent, when in September 2019 the RevPAR had been €66.3.

The highest RevPAR values were registered in Algarve (€63.6), Madeira (€58.9) and Azores (€53.8).

In tourist accommodation establishments as a whole, the average income per occupied room (ADR) reached €92 in September, having grown by 12.4 percent, when in September 2019, the ADR had been €97.2.

Finally, the net bed occupancy rate in tourist accommodation establishments (44.0 percent) increased 13.2 percentage points in September (+14.7 points in August).

In September, the highest bed occupancy rates were registered in Madeira (66.7 percent), Azores (54.1 percent) and the Algarve (48.9 percent).

Bumper season for Porto and the North

The region of Porto and the Norte welcomed the most guests this year in Portugal, with more than two million people visiting between January and September.

According to the Porto e Norte Tourism Board, the region had around 448,000 guests in September and "recorded an accumulated value of 2.251 million guests between January and September", which puts the region at the top of the national rankings. Data from the National Institute of Statistics "are excellent signs given what is still a pandemic context", highlights the tourism board, noting that the accumulated value of guests since the beginning of the year is "already close to 50 percent of the value registered in 2019", before the Covid-19 pandemic. Luís Pedro Martins, president of Tourism Board of Porto e Norte. stated that, "in 2023, the region will recover the levels it had in 2019". According to the official, the numbers reflect the strategy implemented by that entity "to rebuild the sector, supporting the



replacement of air connectivity, boosting internationalisation through digitalisation, accelerating the structuring of products according to the profile of the tourist in the post-pandemic and, perhaps more importantly, believing that the government will maintain support for

companies in the sector".

"The tourism sector is back, let's hope the pandemic doesn't dictate new constraints. The recovery will be faster the smaller the impact of the wave that is now being experienced and that is already visible in some European countries", he concluded.

Presentation of MBE Medal to David Thomas

to make the trip from the UK, and SCP Committee members. Representatives of the GNR and the PSP including: Superintendent Martins PSP Commander and the newly appointed GNR Commander, Tenanted Coronel Carlos Almeida were present, plus Civil Protection Operations Commander Richard Marques, the UK Consular Services were also able to be present on this very special occasion. Also from the Algarve was João Fernandes, President Regional Tourism Algarve; Vitor Manuel Gonçalves Aleixo, Mayor of Loulé; Alberto Mota Borges, Director Faro International Airport.

Around 40 guests in all heard the Ambassador praise the work that David and Safe Communities

Private jets increasing but not in Portugal

While the number of private jets grew in Western Europe between 2019 and 2021, in Portugal during the same period it decreased.

Analysis by Colibri Aircraft shows that the registration of private jets in the Western European space grew to 2,444 aircraft, compared to 2,414 in 2020 and 2,344 in 2019.

Data from the firm specialising in the sale, resale and purchase of used private aircraft reveals that Germany has the largest fleet, with a registration of 485 aircraft, followed by the United Kingdom (including Isle of Man, Guernsey and Jersey) with 453.

Portugal appears on the list with 128 aircraft, ahead of countries such as Switzerland, Italy or Spain, although the data indicates

that Portugal was one of the countries that registered the greatest drop in the number of private jets registered between 2019 and 2021, with a total of six less recorded.

The biggest drops in the number of private jets can be seen in the Isle of Man where there are 33 fewer aircraft, followed by the United Kingdom (-22) and France (-10).

In countries with the highest increase in private jets, between 2019 and 2021, the ranking is led

by Germany (+36 aircraft), Malta (+30) and Guernsey (+18).

Oliver Stone, CEO of Colibri Aircraft, said in a statement that "the private jet market held up extremely well during the Covid-19 crisis. Given the problems in the commercial aviation sector, with flights being cancelled, for example, and with almost 700 fewer contact points flying, the existing owners of these aircraft keep them under control, and the market has seen new companies and people looking to buy their

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
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House search in Europe will remain intense, says ECB

On average, 4.5 percent of families in Europe intend to buy a home in the next 12 months, helping to drive property prices and demand even higher.







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ccording to the European Central Bank (ECB), demand for property is to remain at high levels in the coming months based on the fact that 4.5 percent of families are looking to buy in the near future.

"The decision of families to buy a house depends on many factors, including their stability in employment and financial situation, their income and assets. their expectations regarding the general level of house prices and mortgage loan conditions", states a report from the bank by Christine Lagarde.

The report continued to state that "the intention to buy a house varies depending on the income of the families". The data shows that this intention is much higher among families with high incomes - around 6.5 percent -, while for households with lower incomes, the result is lower than the average, being below 4 percent. "Families with higher incomes are much more likely

to express their intention to buy a house and, therefore, they tend to be more supportive of the demand for houses", points out the ECB's economic bulletin. Furthermore, "expected income dynamics also play an important role in decisions to invest in a house: respondents who intend to buy a home in the next 12 months tend to have considerably higher income growth expectations than those who do not plan to do so".

Household savings - which are at their highest levels in Portugal – also influence the decision to buy a house. According to the ECB's findings, savings accumulated by citizens during the pandemic "may continue to drive demand for homes in the short term", as around 44 percent of families committed to saving say they have "the desire to save enough money to make a big purchase in the future (such as a house or a car)".

High demand

There are still other reasons to suggest that the demand for homeowners

will continue to rise for the foreseeable future. In addition to household savings, the ECB also emphasises that the housing segment has become increasingly attractive to invest in. There are also still positive expectations that mortgage loans will continue to present favourable and inviting conditions for families – with interest rates at historic lows. While demand will help to inflate house prices, the ECB warns that the forecast for the evolution of house prices has been "much higher than the expected growth in household incomes". The International Monetary Fund recently highlighted that "house prices have grown faster than wages in more than half of the 35 countries" that make up the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD). When it comes to Portugal, house prices have risen faster than household incomes leading to potential problems for low income families looking to access the housing market.

Lisbon luxury property prices up 2.4%

The average price of luxury properties around the globe has risen by 9.5 percent, however Lisbon has seen more moderate growth at 2.4 percent.

According to Knight Frank's most recent Prime Global Cities Index data, which collated information from 46 cities around the world, 8 out of 10 cities saw luxury home prices rise in the third quarter of 2021 compared to last year.

The price rises registered in this period was even higher than that verified between March and April this year, when the prices of luxury homes in these cities climbed, on average, 8.3 percent, while there are also 16 cities that registered increases of more than 10 percent in the last 12 months.

In Europe, the main increases were registered in Stockholm (11.6 percent), Geneva (10.8 percent) and Edinburgh (8.5 percent). Lisbon rose only 2.4 percent, in line with Madrid, which registered an evolution of 2 percent. The cities of Dublin (4.9 percent)

and Berlin (4.7 percent) almost achieved an increase in the order of 5 percent, while London (0.7 percent) and Bucharest (0.6 percent) registered almost zero growth.

The city of Miami, USA, was where the biggest rise of all was registered with luxury home prices climbing 26.4 percent in a year. "The demand for bigger homes, close to the coast and low taxes in Florida have been the main factors that have attracted a new generation of teleworkers to the US" and in particular to Miami, the survey reads.

While the majority of cities saw growth, there were some locations were luxury home prices fell in the third quarter of 2021 compared to the same period of the previous year, such as New York (-1.8 percent), Bangkok (-2.3 percent) and Jakarta (-4.2 percent).





Solana still the fastest growing



lthough the latest surge of the global crypto market has been fuelled mainly by Bitcoin's and Ethereum's price rally, as the top two digital coins in the crypto space, some other cryptocurrencies witnessed much bigger growth.

According to data presented by StockApps.com, Solana still convincingly tops the list of the fastest-growing cryptos in 2021, with its market cap surging by nearly 1,000 times year-to-date. 170 times bigger growth rate In 2021 only, the number of new

Crypto in 2021 Over the past month and a half, the world's leading cryptos have continued to grow, with most of them reaching new record valuations.

> coins in the crypto space practically doubled, jumping from around 4,000 in January to almost 8,000 this month. However, the vast majority of them don't have the functionality or depth of the big coins like Solana, considered a potential long-term competitor with Ethereum. And there is a reason for that. Transactions on Solana's blockchain are relatively cheap compared to Ethereum because its tech allows tens of thousands of transactions per second, much more than around 100 for ETH.

According to CoinMarketCap data, the combined value of all SOL coins in the crypto space amounted to \$75 million in January. By the end of June, this figure surged to \$8.8bn, despite the crypto price

crash in May. The following months witnessed even more impressive increase, with Solana's market cap skyrocketing to over \$60bn in the first week of September. After a few hectic weeks and another crypto price crash, Solana's market cap continued growing again and hit around \$65bn by the end of October. Statistics show this figure rose to \$73.6, showing a staggering 98,000 percent increase YTD, which is 170 times the growth rate of Ethereum or 748 times more than the growth of Bitcoin in this period. Dogecoin, Binance Coin and Cardano follow

The CoinMarketCap data showed Dogecoin follows Solana when it comes to market cap increase in 2021. Since the beginning of

the year, the combined value of all DOGE coins has surged by 5,334 percent to \$36.3bn.

2021 has also been a fantastic year for Binance Coin, which became the world's third-largest crypto by market cap. Statistics indicate the combined value of all BNB coins soared by 1,909 perecnt YTD to \$108.7bn.

Besides these two cryptos, Cardano and USD Coin were the only digital coins witnessing a four-digit growth this year. Statistics show the combined value of all ADA coins jumped by an impressive 1,311 percent YTD to \$77.9bn, ranking it as the fourth-largest crypto globally. USD Coin follows with \$34.5bn in market cap and 1,119 percent YTD

NFT games surging in popularity

After the NFT cryptocurrency-collectibles exploded in popularity in early 2021, several blockchain-based gaming companies began working to get their share in the new market, gaining more and more users each month.

According to data presented by MejoresApuestas.com, Alien Worlds, Axie Infinity and Splinterlands, as the top three NFT gaming titles, hit almost 2 million monthly users.

Alien Worlds

Bringing NFTs into gaming has caused controversies in the gaming industry. One part of the gaming community thinks the entire "play to earn" concept, based around the idea that unique digital items can increase in value over time and be sold off later for a profit, is disruptive and bad for gaming overall. For example, Steam has even banned blockchain and NFT-based games from its platform.

Its rival, Epic Games, has not, and other major players like Ubisoft are also embracing the entire idea.

Despite the controversies, NFT games

are surging in popularity. According to Dapp Radar data, the NFT metaverse Alien Worlds is the most popular title in the NFT gaming world, with almost 760,000 active monthly players.

Inspired by Nintendo's Pokemon series, the monster-battling game Axie Infinity ranked on the high second place, with 602,000 players in the last 30 days.

Other NFT games have also seen growth in their player base. Splinterlands ranked as the third most-popular NFT gaming title with nearly 600,000 monthly users. Arc8 by GAMEE and MOBOX: NFT Farmer round the top five list, with 380,000 and 187,500 users, respectively.

Top Three NFT Gaming Tokens

Besides reaching more and more users worldwide, the most popular $\ensuremath{\mathrm{NFT}}$ games have also seen the market cap of

their native tokens surge this year. In fact, according to CoinMarketCap data, the combined market capitalization of Axie Infinity (AXS) tokens, Decentraland (MANA) tokens, and Enjin Coin tokens soared by nearly 6,400 percent YTD, rising from \$256 million to a staggering \$16.5bn.

The native token of the blockchain-based game, Axie Infinity, has seen the most impressive growth this year, with its market cap surging by 33,600 percent YTD to \$9.2bn last week.

Decentraland, the second-largest gaming token by market cap, has witnessed a 3,900 percent growth year-to-date, with the combined value of all MANA tokens reaching \$4.8bn last week.

Statistics show the market cap of Enjin Coin tokens hit \$2.5bn last week, a massive 2,200 percent increase since the beginning of the year.

ApolloX launches first Hybrid Derivatives Exchange

ApolloX, the world's first centralised and decentralised (CEX-DEX) hybrid derivatives exchange, have announced its DEX launch, two months after its initial CEX launch in September

ApolloX aims to provide accessibility and anonymity to derivatives trading for both new and experienced traders. Users can easily trade short or long positions in US-DT-based perpetual futures contracts with up to 100x leverage. Depending on their priorities, they may choose to trade on either or both the ApolloX CEX and DEX.

The ApolloX DEX facilitates increased privacy through a non-custodial, trustless environment. Traders bypass a sign-up process and simply need to connect to their wallets to start gas-free trading. For

traders who prefer to store their assets on-exchange, they can sign-up anonymously to trade using the exchange's hot wallets. Both CEX and DEX offer enhanced security measures including 2FA and address whitelisting.

According to the company: "Cryptocurrency trading has become overly complicated today. ApolloX aims to significantly reduce barriers to entry to trade crypto derivatives and fuel explosive growth of this market".

New trading pairs 1000SHIBUSDT, SAN-DUSDT and DOTUS-DT were recently added alongside existing markets BTČUSDT, ETHUSDT, DOGEUSDT and more. More markets and the ApolloX native token will be launched in the next month.

Testing times



Having recently arrived in the Algarve I will begin this piece with some basic but nonetheless, hopefully, quite useful observations regarding remaining travel protocols and restrictions (to and from the UK).



any of us already know that the mere notion of actually getting to Portugal (or to anywhere else for that matter) has recently conjured up the possibility of opening some hefty cans of bureaucratic worms. Travel has been arduous because of constantly moving goalposts. Of course, the goalposts were moved as the trajectory of the pandemic itself constantly ebbed and flowed. In fairness, no one really had any experience of dealing with anything quite like Covid-19. It became a nightmare scenario unfolding before our very eyes in real time. Various authorities struggled to keep ahead of it all, producing a plethora of mixed messages which only served to muddy the waters.

But I can hereby declare, with a fair degree of certainty, that the following details were correct at the time of writing. However, I will earnestly suggest that it's a good idea to double check these sorts of things for yourself before embarking on any trips.

I am, however, particularly sure of my onions in this instance. That's because I'm typing some of this whilst enjoying an ice cold beer under the shady parasols of Bar Habana on the gloriously sundrenched seafront of Praia da Luz. So it worked out for me at least. I'm here in Portugal, hence, my air of confidence!

There are still a few hoops to jump through

It's pretty important for any would-be travellers to realise that there are still a few of these dreaded hoops remaining. It's by no means a case of entirely plain

sailing despite some extensive relaxation of key Covid-19 rules. However, it must be said, the number of hoops are gradually diminishing and life for travellers is slowly but surely edging back towards some degree of normality. No tests (either PCR or the lateral flow variety) are currently required before travelling into Portugal from the UK. However, this only applies if you're fully vaccinated (as in having received both initial jabs). Relevant proof will still need to be presented in the form of an official NHS vaccination certificate before anyone is allowed to travel. You'll definitely need to have these documents to hand when you arrive at an airport checkin. It's best to have the tangible paper variety opposed to a digital example. That's because digital versions actually have an expiry date whereas the paper ones don't. The other one is; you'll need to fill out and print a copy of Portugal's 'passenger locator form'. This can be done online. There are links to follow on the GOV.UK website. So, in summary, amidst all the usual paraphernalia that's the default applicable with any outbound flights to Portugal, you'll now need your NHS vaccination certificate and your Portuguese passenger locator form. This applies to each adult travelling. These documents WILL be requested by airport staff when you check in for your flight.

Returning to the UK

In order to get back to the UK, you'll need to fill in the UK passenger locator form (I know, please bear with me!). This UK form can also be accessed and filled in online. However, there's a sting

in the tale because you won't be able to complete this UK form until 48 hours before your return flight! It's important not to forget to complete this UK passenger locator form before heading to the airport for the homebound leg of the trip. Again, this must be completed by every travelling adult within a family or group.

I personally started the process of filling in my own details before even leaving the UK. The information I provided was securely saved on the online platform and can easily be accessed at a later date in order to complete the process. This simply means less fiddling whilst abroad.

Internet access

Naturally, all these additional requirements means that Internet access will be required during your time away. No problem for most of us these days of course but a modern smartphone or access to a tablet/laptop will be essential gizmos in this instance. Finally, it's mandatory to book and pay for a privately sourced lateral flow test kit before leaving the UK. This is currently required for returning to the UK. You cannot use the free NHS kits for any travel purposes. They will not be counted nor will they be considered valid.

The remaining test that's still required

And it's a fairly cheap lateral flow test. I booked mine by finding the relevant details via my chosen airline's website. The test cost me £25 (per person) and only ONE test is required.

This lateral flow test must be carried out on DAY-2 after returning to the UK. The test involves the usual swabbing (most of us will be entirely familiar with that process nowadays). Then it's a case of scanning the QR code and photographing the flow test unit before reporting it all back to the laboratory from where it was purchased (Randox in my case). All the instructions will be provided in each test pack. Randox has an app which must be downloaded beforehand.

Before concluding this section, I think it's fair to suggest that life tends to be a whole lot easier for tech-savvy travellers these days. I confess that I relied quite heavily on my kids to help me out with a few of these things. But, I got here – and that's what counts.

Please note that children under the age of 12, i.e. "up to and including 11," are currently exempt from the above rules. Please check before embarking on any trip as rules tend to change quite regularly.

Autumn in the Algarve

Having completed all the above, I must confess that I found the Algarvian autumn vastly preferable to the winter woollens, the mittens and the inevitable cracking of Guy Fawkes fireworks on those ever lengthening and increasing dank evenings which inevitably prelude an impending British winter. Here in the Algarve, I was pleasantly surprised to see just how many places remain open for business. The balmy Algarvian sunshine still draws in plenty of eager travellers. After all, the days are still as warm as the finest British summer's days. From bathers in Burgau to sunsets in Sagres - the crowds just keep on being drawn in by the unique allure of the Algarve. Although fewer in number than during the peak summer months, the late season tourists still help create that distinctive Algarvian vibe. A vibe that was absolutely captured when I visited Cape St Vincent on the 4 November to witness yet another one of its fabled sunsets. So despite all the additional efforts required to secure safe passage to and from Portugal, these efforts are duly rewarded when we arrive on Portuguese shores.

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Travel - You get what you pay for



Over the last few weeks, I have written about travel to Portugal by air, train and ferry.

hat is surprising is the very high readership these stories create, especially the possibility of high speed rail. It becomes very clear that many people are very interested in more eco friendly ways to travel to Portugal, but equally it must be said if **The Portugal News** writes about Ryanair, the reader response is also great. Price and time are still critical to many.

What I personally find confusing is that the Algarve has a high percentage of high income permanent or part time residents. They own multi-million Euro properties, but still use the likes of Ryanair.

Back in the day, several airlines offered direct London to Faro flights with a business class option. It would be reasonable to assume that high income individuals, given that they don't own a private jet (and many do) would prefer to fly in comfort rather than with their knees under their chin in economy class

British Airways will still offer you business class from Heathrow, but at a cost approaching £1,000, it's not cheap. But as Ryanair boss Michael O'Leary, frequently points out, "you get what you pay for". For a handful of loose change, he will fly you to Faro low season, probably on time but with little or no comfort.

If your only consideration is getting here fast and cheap, the low-cost airlines are here to stay and happy to sell you a seat. That seat might increase to €200 or even €300 in the busy season, but it's the same seat and the same service.

Could the low costs offer more?

Of course, it's always possible that companies like Ryanair, easyJet etc would start to offer an enhanced service at the front of the aircraft, given that there was any demand. It only means leaving the centre seat free and hanging a curtain between those seats and economy. At a guess, they could easily ask three or four times the standard fare, and only need to offer wine and a meal tray. If there was a demand, be sure they would take this seriously. If you agree, why not write to them and request such a service.

Take longer, save the planet

The critical question is, are more eco friendly and comfortable methods of travel under development, and would you be happy to take a day or two to travel to Portugal. From the reader response **The Portugal News** has had, I believe the answer is yes.

However, many questions have been raised which deserve an answer. The first, and by far the most important, is to do with high-speed train rails and compatibility between countries. What most people don't realise is the EU, never famous for forward vision, have in fact been working on this for years. Since 2000, the EU has been investing €23.7 billion into high-speed rail infrastructure. France and Spain have the most advanced high-speed networks, Spain received 47.3

percent of the total EU funding for high speed development, and they have used it very effectively. (2018 EU report). Portugal at that time had received 3.9 percent of the funding budget, but the EU are now funding the Lisbon - Madrid link which is expected to come into service late next year.

Seville - Faro link - don't hold your breath


The suggestion of a high-speed link between Seville and Faro, is, at best, many years away, if it's practical. There exists a working rail link between Seville and Huelva. There is also an unused link from Huelva to Ayamonte, but the rails were taken up years ago. Then there is the minor problem of getting across the river, the existing bridge was not constructed with the possibility of adding rails in the future. Maybe a great idea but massively expensive.

In 2007, a consortium of European Railway operators, Railteam, emerged to co-ordinate and boost cross-border high-speed rail travel. Developing a Trans-European high-speed rail network is a stated goal of the European Union, and most cross-border railway lines receive EU funding. Several countries — France, Spain, Italy, Germany, Austria, Sweden, Belgium, the Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, Russia and the United Kingdom — are connected to a cross-border high-speed railway network.

France has the second largest high-speed network in Europe, with 2,800 km of operative HSR lines in June 2021, only behind Spain's 3,402 km. London, France and Spain are now fully interconnected with a high speed rail network. The reality of very fast train travel is already available as far as Marid or onwards to Southern Spain. It's much more than a plan, its already working. Madrid - Lisbon is not far behind.

Sleeper trains

High quality sleeper services are being launched very rapidly, check out Midnight Trains. The question is that if you could soon travel in comfort, overnight to Portugal, probably in little over 24 hours, how attractive would that alternative be. Readers have also asked if the new highspeed trains will carry cars. I think that has to be a big no; Eurostar do have car carriages but over long distance at high speed this does not sound practical. That leaves us with the third alternative, a car ferry to Lisbon, something many readers ask about. If you are thinking eco, so to speak, there are not much CO, savings to be made, car ferries are better than air travel, but a long way from being kind to the environment. It's also obvious that the ferry companies that serve northern Spain seem to have little, if any, interest, or enthusiasm to extend their service to Lisbon. If you think they should, write to them. If there is a demand they may well look more seriously at this option. Pressure from consumers can work.



For the environmentally conscious readers, here is a quick guide to the four cleanest ways to travel:

Bicycle. 0g CO₂ per km (not a practical as a

way to travel to Portugal). 100% Electric Car. 12g CO₂ per km. International Rail 15.1g CO₂ per km. Ferry 19.3g CO₂ per km.

At a recent Almancil International Rotary Club meeting, the guest speaker was Corporal Daniel Dias from the Guarda Nacional Republica (GNR) Loulé, who, together with his colleague Sgt Luís Tavares, also from the GNR Loulé, gave a presentation on policing in

Portugal.

The responsibilities of the GNR range from, but are not restricted to, dealing with traffic violations, acts of terrorism, assisting the bombeiros with evacuations when necessary. customs enforcement a bomb disposal unit; horse unit which

makes regular checks in the Loulé area, a dog unit, coastal patrols and a ceremonial horse unit. The GNR has also provided detachments which have participated in international operations in Iraq, East Timor and other countries where there is conflict. In general the GNR's purpose is to protect the community.

Corporal Dias explained that whilst many people are aware of the GNR through their day-to-day activities (hopefully not through traffic violations) many may not be aware that in addition to the GNR there are four other police organisations in Portugal namely, the Public Security Police (PSP) the Judicial Police, Maritime Police and SEF - Serviço de Estrangeiros e Fronteiras which many of us are involved with when applying for or renewing residency permits.

Corporal Dias's primary responsibility is to head up the Safe Residency programme

originally started in 2006 by Rotarian Peter Hinze and GNR Officer Frederico Fragoso allocating each property in the Vale Telheiro and Poço Geraldo areas in Loulé a house number and GPS coordinate to assist the GNR in providing a rapid response in cases of emergencies. It isn't only the GNR which adopted the system. It's also being used by other emergency and rescue services which now also have a way to find remote locations. There can be nothing worse than having a heart attack and the ambulance not able to locate the patient.

The scheme grew to other outlying areas in Portugal and has been extended to a Safe Residents and Safe Schools programme in the Loulé area organised by Corporal Dias.

Return to Portugal



Portugal is a feeling more than a sight, sound, taste, or singular smell.

he terrain is varied, each region offering different experiences in the landscape, flavours and recipes, wine, and even dialects. Finally, after a series of global delays, my wife Phyllis and I have returned to where we left our hearts and souls in early 2020, our beloved Portugal. We missed this country of delights for so many reasons, both tangible and intangible. Here are some of them.

Deep, delicious dive

Walkable villages, where we prefer to live in Portugal, are a delight. We've always loved European culture, especially what we call café life. We happily walk the colourful cobblestone streets, observing locals at the cafés and bars that are so prevalent in any central square or along coastal walkways. It is remarkable how much fun it can be to enjoy a small snack or an entire meal outside.

Ultimately, we get scent-induced hunger pangs. The intoxicating aromas distract us from the beautiful hand-painted historic tiles or intricate calçadas. They beckon us to explore deep into neighbourhoods and villages. This is always our preference. Instead of remaining in tourist-trampled zones, we dig deeper, seeking the small bar restaurants (tascas). We amble down unknown avenues following our noses, seeking out those tascas offering family-triedand-true dishes, allowing us to taste grandma's cooking, nestling into an authentic experience.

Turf or surf?

Visiting Portugal since the 1980's, most of our time has been spent

in waterfront cities and villages, enjoying a mainstay of Portuguese cuisine-seafood. Plentiful and fresh daily, our earliest exposure to the tasty seafood of the Algarve was on our honeymoon in 1981-82 where we lived for six months in Quarteira and Villamoura. In Quarteira, down the main road

within walking distance of our small inn, was a tiny thatch-roofed shanty housing a dirt-floored restaurant run by a young couple. As you would find at that time, the oldest son, who was about 12 years old, was our waiter.

We'd order their specialty, frango piri-piri, and an ice-cold Sagres, the Portuguese national beer (cerveja), and enjoy connecting with this lovely Portuguese family. There was a hole in the roof, which allowed most of the smoke to escape from the wood-fired, open-pit style churrasco (bbq). The frango was delicious. The entire meal was a deal at 120 escudos each (\$4 US total), including dessert and coffee.

In Albufeira, our second primary haunt, moored amongst the gentle waves of the inky dark Atlantic nighttime and until the wee hours of the mornings, at least 50 dim lights were bobbing in the distance, squid boats and their masters plying their

We could find lulas (small squid) first thing at dawn, caught overnight, as well as varied and abundant varieties of right-off-the-boat fish. From those balmy mornings, we discovered a forever-favorite dish, stuffed lulas. This perfectly cooked succulent dish is unforgettable. It's what delicious dreams are made of. To this day, when we return to Portugal, stuffed lulas are what we

immediately search for in those small tascas.

The tasty stuffing is made using many ingredients (chefs' choice) as well as the usual garlic and abundant olive oil. Into those small body pockets go diced tentacles, seasoned by experienced hands, knowledge passed down by moms, dads, and grandparents who take great pride in fabulous family recipes.

Saudade*

We feel we owe our respect and admiration to the Portuguese people in return for their everhelpful and accommodating ways. In our travels, we've found that learning basic, polite phrases in the local language and/or dialect is appreciated. When possible, we respectfully greet locals and order meals in Portuguese. Even when we struggle with the pronunciation (aside from natives, who doesn't), the Portuguese smile and work toward understanding our communication.

During the crazy times we've recently lived through, we missed Portugal and our international community of accepting friends more than ever. This sweet, deeply lasting feeling brings about constant memories. We are thrilled to return, be enveloped in that cultural hug, and return the love and admiration.

Portugal beckons us, never lets us go, and we eagerly return to her charming embrace. Saudade saturates us all the way down to our toes. We love Portugal and relish our return.

1 lb (.5 kg) fresh baby squid 1 chouriço sausage, finely chopped 2 onions, chopped and divided in

2 cloves of garlic, minced and divided in half

4 tomatoes, chopped

1 egg




clove of garlic, chouriço, and the chopped tentacles. Mix well. Add the egg and mix to bind. Stuff the squid with the mixture. Close them with a toothpick and place in a large baking dish.

3. In a medium frying pan, sauté the remaining onion and garlic in olive oil over medium heat until fragrant. Add tomatoes, bay leaf, a few pinches of the parsley, and salt and pepper to taste. Simmer for 10 minutes on low heat.

4. Cover the stuffed squid with the tomato mixture and bake at 255°C for 25-30 minutes. Remove from oven, sprinkle with remaining

How the band members got into music?



Sintra: returning to a great, but mysterious past



Sintra is a Portuguese city that belongs to the district of Lisbon. It currently has more than 385,000 inhabitants. Visitors to the city will enter an environment that is considered by many to be mystical, where the fog passes through palaces and large houses.



intra is also the city of legends and myths, and some believe that in the Serra de Sintra there were freemasonry rituals or even more obscure sects. Sintra is a city linked to nobility and royalty, with several palaces that served as a residence not only for Portuguese kings but also housed wealthy families from, for example, England. Upon arriving in the city, visitors

automatically enter a historic mood. Sintra, despite having followed the gradual growth of urban modernity, still preserves very typical elements of 19th and 20th-century architecture, which can be observed in the houses built in the centre of the city.

During a visit to Sintra it is almost mandatory to visit the Palácio da

Pena. The palace combines several architectural styles, from neo-Gothic to romanticism. It is located at the top of the Serra de Sintra in Monte da Lua. In 2019, the National Statistics Institute (INE) mentioned that Palácio da Pena was one of the monuments that received the most visitors in the country. The entire history and architectural beauty of the monument attracts not only the attention of tourists but also of teachers who organise study visits with students, as a way to make students experience the subjects being taught at school. In the gardens surrounding the Palácio da Pena, within the Serra de Sintra area, considered a UNESCO World Heritage Site, the Countess D'Edla's Chalet is also located, built by the Prince Consort Fernando II, the

second husband of the Portuguese Queen Maria II.

A rich history

Sintra as a city has always been the favourite of the Portuguese court, which during several reigns served as the official residence of the Portuguese crown. Of course, the king's residence would have to be a highlight and palaces were the preferred buildings. Still, within a route of palaces belonging to the kings of Portugal, it is in Sintra that the Palácio Nacional is placed. Built in the 12th century, it is one of the only examples of medieval palaces in Portugal. The building's highlight is the two chimneys, which were used to extract the air from grand kitchens that can be visited by tourists.

As mentioned earlier, foreign magnates and aristocrats chose. Sintra as their favourite place to spend their summer holidays. This was the case of the Englishman Francis Cook, who in 1856 had the Palace of Monserrate built. Around the palace, there is a whole panoply of botanical varieties brought by Cook from all over the world, in a garden with an area of 50 square metres.

The testimony of the Muslim presence in the city is evidenced by the Castelo dos Mouros, a castle built on a rocky peak in the Serra de Sintra between the 8th and 9th centuries. In this location, due to its altitude, it is possible to have a

panoramic view of the city of Sintra that will surely enchant everyone who passes by.

Filled with mystery

One of the most mystical places in Sintra is undoubtedly Quinta da Regaleira. The space, made up of various motifs linked to Freemasonry and mythology, benefits from a unique microclimate. It is common at Quinta da Regaleira to have some fog, which helps in the description of the space as mysterious. The space has a dimension of four hectares. there is a palace, lakes, gardens, caves, and the high point of the space: Poço Iniciático. Poço Iniciático is a well that resembles a tower, as you need to descend nine floors to reach the bottom. At the bottom of the well is the compass rose above the Templar Cross, which dates back to Freemasonry. The well was given the name Iniciático because it is believed that it was at the bottom of the well, at Quinta da Regaleira, that the initiation rituals for entry into the Rosicrucian Order of Portuguese Freemasonry were consummated. (Iniciático is a word formed from the verb "iniciar", in Portuguese, which means "to start", in English). Scholars believe that symbolically the place represents the soil as the womb, where life begins.

Gastronomy

That Portugal has vast gastronomy is already known and Sintra is no exception. Going to Sintra and

not trying a Travesseiro will make any visit incomplete. It is at Casa Piriquita that the best Travesseiros in Sintra are said to be. The pastry shop has 160 years of history and began as a bakery that sold Queijadas that were the delight of those who passed by. Due to the success of the Queijadas, which can still be tasted, the bakery establishment became a pastry shop and around the 40s the daughter of the founding couple of Casa Piriquita discovered the recipe for Travesseiros de Sintra in an old cookbook. The traditional Travesseiro de Sintra is made according to a secret recipe that has been carried over for five generations. It is known that the pillow-shaped cake is made with puff pastry, which is then filled with egg and almond cream and one more secret ingredient. Nowadays it is possible to taste Travesseiros stuffed with apple or chocolate cream.

to the rural. With gardens and palaces that will make any visitor go back to the past and even more enigmatic places that go back to urban legends and myths. Sintra is a mysterious place, used to film a Nicolas Cage horror film, "Color Out of Space" and a Portuguese soap opera with a vampire theme, "Lua Vermelha." In addition to personal transport, the easiest way to get to Sintra is by train from Lisbon, where you take the train to get to Sintra and step back into the past.

Sintra is a historic city, with an

I had the pleasure of speaking with an inspiring and resilient author from Canada, Madelyn June Jorgensen.



I asked June what readers can hope to gain from reading her memoir and she kindly shared that "I believe that you should never give up and that it is important to follow through and take risks in one's life and have no regrets, because writing this book was a big risk for me and I only cared about my son's reaction to the story."

"Facing one's fear and forgiveness is essential as well as following your dreams but most of all, the importance of family and spending as much time together as possible, I have been able to travel with my son and work hard on building a better relationship with my son and we have become really close following these traumatic ordeals in our lives.' finally reaching the Atlantic Ocean.


Along with survival skills, Pip learnt the value of community, forgiveness and self-belief. In this book she shares many pearls of wisdom that we can all apply to our own lives.

I am a huge fan of Simon's shows and books so I was excited to read his new one.


In this book we follow Simon as he reveals inside stories on some of his adventures and experiences all around the world.

hat's all fine and well I hear you say but who is Prof Haim Eshed and why should I care? Haim Eshed was the former Israeli space security chief and a retired brigadier general in the Israeli Military Intelligence department. He holds a bachelor's degree in electronics engineering and a master's degree and a doctorate in aeronautical engineering.

For more than 30 years Haim was not only responsible for the launch of 20 Israeli-made satellites and many consider him the grandfather of the Israeli space program.

As the former chair of the Space committee council for research and development, he also served in the highly secretive Unit 81 who is known to provide "solutions" for the Military intelligence directorate.







hey opened last year in February and I had the pleasure of speaking with the owner, Rogério Malheiro. They are the Winner of TripAdvisor Travellers' Choice 2021 and featured in the book "Boa cama boa mesa" by newspaper Expresso for the best restaurants of Portugal 2021. Rogério Malheiro has lived in the Algarve for three years and told me his wife was born here. He has always loved gastronomy and cooking at home and decided

to make his dream a reality with Gaspacho & Migas, explaining that he "loved the location in Lagoa and all that the Algarve has to offer".

Revitalising recipes

This Portuguese restaurant is all about revitalising ancient Algarve and Alentejo recipes with a modern twist and showcasing the valuable heritages that reveal deep knowledge. Through Rogério Malheiro's own travelling experiences, he decided that



he wanted the décor of the restaurant to "embody rustic with the industrial to resemble a Modern Bistro." selection of fresh bread with two delicious homemade butters, which were roast butter and the other was mushrooms and truffle. Then for starters, we had the crab soup which I can say is the best soup I have ever had. The waiter brought over an eloquently presented bowl with crab, croutons and coriander and then, with finesse, poured a clear glass bottle of crab soup over the bowl. It was a warm and inviting soup, which was subtly spicy from the red curry but it was not overpowering. Every mouthful was comforting and it was an explosion of flavours! The smoked Jalapeños gaspacho with sesame seeds, had a subtle kick and every spoonful was fresh and flavoursome. We then had a wonderful experience trying all the different flavours of Gaspacho & Migas with their fantastic tapas. The tapas embody all the flavours of the Algarve and Alentejo cuisine. The tapas were delightful which included shrimp,

octopus, Iberian pork ham from the Alentejo and alheira spheres. I was recommended the Octopus and the Gamba da Costa, the dish is premium octopus, Algarve prawns, yellow beetroot, sweet potato purée, vegetables and coriander pesto sauce and sweet potato crisps. The sweet potato purée was creamy and complimented the octopus really well, I would definitely recommend Gaspacho & Migas solely to experience octopus cooked perfectly, which is something I have found is difficult to find in the Algarve. We also tried the Iberian pork with asparagus migas, which included grilled plum, vegetables and chimichurri which is found in Argentinian and Uruguayan cuisines. The creamy gratin worked so well with the Iberian pork, with all the small details adding bursts of colour to the plate, creating the most superb, edible piece of art. For dessert, we tried the coffee and chocolate which was presented beautifully with such flair. It was irresistible and delightful with coffee meringue with raspberry and lemon, caramelized white chocolate, chocolate gelatine which is the most rich and luxurious jelly, coffee ice cream, toasted hazelnuts and chocolate sauce. We also tried their chocolate mousse which I urge all chocolate fans to try as

it was incredible and light and

creamy with chocolate crispy biscuits and fresh berries, which contrasted the chocolate perfectly, adding a subtle sharpness.

The unique and colourful Jessica Dunn



My visit to the Dunn studio to find out more about how this extraordinary local artist brings the Algarve's natural colours to life on canvas.

> sky, land and seascapes. Her work now brilliantly catches the contrast in colours that the sun highlights as it paints the clouds at sunset, or casts shadows through the trees or sparkles on the water. Indeed, while I was there,



remember that a few weeks ago I told you all about an event I attended at the Algarve International School (AIS) near Vale do Lobo called The Big Draw. The five local lady artists from the recently formed Quinta Art Collective (Jessica Dunn, Jane Rodenburg, Toin Adams, Andrea M. Bird and Tracy Carson) had come down and were helping the kids splash about with some paint and create, what turned out to be, some really quite beautiful murals on the front wall of the school.

While I was there, Jessica Dunn very kindly invited me to come by and see her studio sometime. Jessica grew up in London but has been coming to the Algarve her whole life and has been based here permanently since 1987. She's one of those people who, growing up here, I feel like I've always heard of but knew embarrassingly little about and so I jumped at the chance to find out more. The Dunn Studio is located

in Boliqueime and Jessica told me that maybe it would be best if we met at the cemetery as people tend to get lost if they try to follow Google any further than that. I met Jessica here and we walked up to the studio. Next to the family house, it was originally built for her father, the much loved comedy actor Clive Dunn (from Dad's Army), as he always had a huge passion for drawing and painting, something that rubbed off on Jessica, who has been painting her whole life.

Indeed, during my visit, it became apparent that the whole family is a creative one. Her mother, Priscilla Morgan, who I only met briefly, was an actress too, and Jessica's daughters, Alice and Lydia, also paint and draw. This means that all the wall space in the house is covered in drawings of beautiful places and quirky creatures, as well as quite a few portraits they painted of each other. Even outside in the garden, Jessica pointed out a cat statue on the roof she had made and also commented

that they should really get around to touching up the mural of tropical birds that her dad painted by the pool. The trouble with everybody being so creative, I began to see, is where to put everything? But there are definitely worse problems. I thought it was wonderful.

But anyway, 'back to the studio' (as they say). It was a very circular room, think 'lighthouse' sort of shape, and, come to think of it, a lighthouse is a good way to describe it for another reason as well. The many windows allow all that gorgeous Algarvian sunshine to come streaming in and provide the perfect light in which to see Jessica's paintings that are largely inspired by that very same sunlight and the colours and contrast it creates as it dances around familiar scenes from life here in southern Portugal. You see, although she used to paint more figurative paintings, in the last five years or so she has transitioned into more abstract art and takes her inspiration mainly from

a patch in one of the paintings was lit up in the sunshine, bringing out a square of striking bright light orange, which I mistakenly thought was part of the painting. Jessica liked it too and I think I started her mind whirling about how she could replicate that effect on the canvas permanently. Working with oils and acrylic, Jessica told me how she's got into the habit of starting all her paintings by bringing them 'down to earth' and covers them in a background of a lovely orangey terracotta colour - the same colour you find on the ground in so many places around here. She then proceeds to work her magic, taking her time, adding a splash of paint here and scraping a bit off there, until, eventually, a place or a familiar feeling starts to emerge. She works on several simultaneously and the key, she said, is knowing when to stop. They are abstract and thus open to your own imagination and interpretation. Indeed, she laughed and showed me one that had recently been exhibited in a gallery the wrong way around and that even she didn't notice until later when she looked more closely and realised it looked much better the original way up. She does name them and that gives you a little clue as to the inspiration. My favourite was 'Somewhere' with a streak across the sky that I later realised was, of course, a rainbow. (It's smaller counterpart was placed 'Way Up High' in the room next door.)



There was one based on the 'levant' dust storms we get from time to time, others take you for a stroll 'Into The Woods', and there's a series of 'Blue' paintings to which you will have to make up your own mind if they are sea or the sky. I was really quite enchanted by Jessica's work and I'm doing my best to describe them, but it's difficult. I don't think even photos do them justice - you need to see them for yourself. (Having said that, she does have some beautiful limited edition prints on which you can almost 'feel the paint'.) She told me that she had also found a company that takes her paintings and makes scarfs, bags, wallets, pillowcases and even, more recently, masks. Which I think is a wonderful idea as you can now 'wear her art' and the brilliant colours

of her paintings make the perfect adornments to decorate and light up your day to day life with. There were lots of unopened packages on the ground which Jessica told me was artwork from the rest of the Quinta Art Collective that had started to arrive. This is because on the weekend of Friday the 3rd of December (from 5 pm - 8.30 pm) and on Saturday & Sunday (between 11 am and 6 pm) they will be holding an exhibition there at the studio with their 'Small Works' (so that there's space to display all of their talents).

Do all ants fly?

I have seen swarms of them recently and wondered if all species fly

onditions have to be just about perfect for ants (called 'formigas' in Portugal) to take to the air – after all, they are not only land based insects, but underground based, so why suddenly lift off? And they are huge juicy looking things too. I watched some in my garden the other day, and some had landed and were actually running around trying to shed their

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wings, some had shed one wing and looked like they were frantically running round to get rid of the other one, I likened them to someone struggling to get an arm out of a sweater that was too small! All ant species have some ants who develop wings and fly, and when the ant colony is naturally ready to expand, the mature winged ants get ready to take centre stage, and like an alarm has gone off, they all get the message to leave home. Their sole purpose in life now is to mate, and the females will then start a new colony. The weather conditions

have to be just right bright sunlight, low wind, high humidity and warm temperatures, preferably after 3 or 4 days of rain -

all conditions we have had recently - and bingo, off they went, great swarms of them, flying and landing, some getting picked off by birds, some successful, some not, some drowning in puddles or pools. These are sexually mature ants, called 'alates' by entomologists. They are the "reproducers' of the colony, created by the 'queen' and fed by the 'workers'. They go through their immature stages developing inside of the colony, and when the ant colony is naturally ready to expand, the winged ants get ready to take the stage. The males and females of all the colonies simultaneously fly out to mate, or as close together as possible. They create mating aggregations called 'hilltopping' around

trees, bushes, chimneys,

towers, trucks and other large or high structures, and this increases their chances of finding a mate and the successful fertilization of the queens-to-be. Incredibly, a queen ant can live for decades, the males just a week. Once underground, the queens will not eat for weeks until they have produced their own daughter workers. They use energy from their fat stores and redundant flight muscles to lay their first batch of eggs, which they fertilise using sperm stored from their nuptial flight. It is the same stock of sperm acquired from long dead males that allows a queen to continue laying fertilised eggs for her entire life. Queens never mate again. And amazingly, once the queen does die, the



until eventually they all die

These huge swarms can seem a bit intimidating, but the ants have only one thing on their minds! Ants that fly don't represent any greater danger to you than your typical ant that crawls. And flying ants don't bite unless their genus bites also, for example, fire ants with wings will bite the same as fire ants without wings.

Shortly after the mating 'deed' is done, the males all die, and the females start looking for places to start a new colony. Seeing a swarm is nothing to get alarmed about. After all, roughly half will die and not all queens will be successful as everything has to fall into place for her - no predators,

If a swarm happens to invade your home, it would be wise to get the professionals in, especially if they are headed into any wall spaces they find. Flying ants are sometimes mistaken for woodchomping termites - that's another pest altogether! - and before you panic, you can tell the difference by their appearance. Termites have straight, wide bodies, and ants have narrow, pinched bodies. Once you're close enough to compare the bodies of termites to ants, you'll likely see that the abdomen on a termite has no defined waist with a rectangular shape, whereas ants have well-defined pinched

HAVE YOU SEEN?

The Whimbrel is a slightly smaller relative of the better known Curlew. It breeds in the sub-Arctic and Arctic tundra and, in the western part of its range, migrates south to winter from the Mediterranean region to sub-Saharan Africa. It also reaches remote oceanic islands, which can be revisited annually. Up to 40 came to Santa Maria in the Azores each year and the repeat presence of a bird of the distinctive American form (and evidence of hybridisation) confirmed it was the same individuals. Two Eurasian races have a vast range stretching from Greenland to Siberia. Eastern birds reach Australia in large numbers in winter, so this is a very common species globally.

Whilst the Curlew's longer curved bill restricts its winter distribution to areas with soft mud, like tidal estuaries, Whimbrels are more versatile and can often be found on rocky coasts hunting for small crabs and other crustacea in rock pools. In The Gambia I found large numbers in the mangrove swamps there, where some non-breeders could be found throughout

The dark stripes on the head distinguish Whimbrels from small juvenile Curlews, as does their evocative call - an loud

piping consisting of between 6 and ten rapidly repeated notes. This often reveals the passage of flocks of high-flying migrants in spring and autumn, both during the day and at night. Confusingly, though, a bird surprised at close range can call 'cur-loo'!

In Portugal, Whimbrels can occur in large numbers on coasts during both migrations. Over 600 have been counted in the Alvor estuary in April, when I have seen flocks arriving over the sea from Morocco from my vantage point at Salema. In autumn they follow the west coast southwards, with some stopping off to rest and feed in the Tagus estuary. More than a thousand have congregated in the Ria Formosa marshes in August but most of these then move on, leaving only a small wintering population. Recoveries of ringed birds indicate arrivals from Britain, northern Europe and Scandinavia, although

some of these will have been trapped on migration.

Nearly time for Poinsettias!

I can't believe how close Christmas is now





have been looking out for poinsettia plants, they are just the epitome of Christmas, with rich colours of red and green. I have to say, at the time of writing this, I haven't seen

any vet - at least not real ones. although the garden centre I visited today was a full-on Christmas masterpiece already, knee deep in fake snow, pine garlands, baubles and jolly Santas, and I felt like I was

in a botanical version of a well-known Swedish furniture warehouse, there was no escape on my route, you just had to walk through it all! They had bunches of artificial poinsettias in amongst their displays - and

there's nothing wrong with that, I hasten to add, as they will certainly last longer than real ones, but a real one can be planted out in Portugal, and there is a strong chance it might at the very least remain a viable plant for next year. Poinsettias (Euphorbia pulcherrima) are actually from Mexico and Central America originally, and gets its name from Joel Robert Poinsett, a botanist and the first US Minister to Mexico, who is said to have introduced the plant to the US in the 1820s, and began sending them back to his greenhouses in South Carolina. Prior to being called poinsettia, its original name was 'Mexican Flame Flower' or 'Painted Leaf'.

It has a history tracing back to the ancient Aztecs, who saw the plant as a symbol of purity, and the plants grow in the wild in tropical forests. Originally, they were cultivated for a practical reason - to make red dyes and medicines. Mexican legend has it that sometime in the 16th century the plant became synonymous with Christmas - a girl who

wanted to prepare a gift to celebrate the birth of Jesus had no money to offer a proper gift, and the story goes that an angel came to her in a vision and told her to gather plants and weeds growing along the roadside and to place them at the altar of the church as a humble gift given with love. There, they sprouted red and green leaves, leading the congregation to believe they witnessed a Christmas miracle. Their colours range from creamy white to pink, to the traditional red, and the colourful parts are actually bracts, which look like petals, with tiny yellow flowers in the centre, called cyathia. Some varieties have bracts with patterns in red and white, pink

and white, or green and white



and even bright orange. These eye-catching bracts attract insects and will drop after pollination.

Interestingly, the bracts change colour in response to the shorter winter days and actually bloom when the days get shorter. To encourage one to 'colour up' in time for Christmas, about 8 weeks before display time, they require as much bright light as possible in order to absorb energy for colour production during the day, but shouldn't receive any light at all for at least 12 hours a day, perhaps covered up with a cardboard box or put in a dark room overnight.

To keep them blooming each year, they need care - when the leaves begin to yellow or when the plant is no longer desired in the festive season, gradually withhold water,

and keep the plant somewhat on the dry side; water only enough to keep the stems from withering. You can grow them outdoors in your garden if you live in a frost-free area, and I recall I kept one going on a sheltered terrace. Whether potted or in the ground, they should be pruned twice a year, first in the spring and again in late summer. I read somewhere that remembering the 'A' months is a helpful tip, April and August. For the first pruning in April remove all foliage and cut all branches back to 4-6" of height. Yes, it sounds drastic, but it will encourage new growth - and use fertilizer as soon as this new growth emerges. Poinsettias are not to be eaten, though are not harmful to animal or human health - they are not poisonous, but the sap may cause dermatitis.





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
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How to keep warm this winter



And how to keep your spirits up on these cold nights!

remember my first trip to Portugal before we moved here. It was January – probably the worst time of year you might say, but for someone who has just left the frozen wastes of Ireland, it was warm, yes even balmy, and we shed our coats in the taxi and grinned like idiots at the blue sky. We had come to visit some friends near Albufeira for a week, and while our hosts stayed indoors in their sweaters, we spread ourselves out on their sunbeds, took off our socks, rolled up our trouser legs and took in the views of the sparkling sea while basking in the sun. We scoffed at the locals, fashionably dressed in boots and scarves and jackets, and wondered how on earth they would cope with the harsh reality of winters where people acquired chilblains, or an arctic blast threatened to rip the skin off your face and render your lips unable to form basic words. Well, we are living here now,

and are finally experiencing the realities of Portuguese winters, and the next one is just around the corner. The thing is, we have found out that there is such a wide contrast in the day and night temperatures during the winter, that it seems much more noticeable. The smiles have been wiped from our faces as we know that as soon as the sun starts to dip, we should hurry up home or get inside and shut the door, as it's like an invisible switch has turned the heat down and opened the way for the 'cold monster' to extend his icy fingers over us. Add in the unpredictable rain, and we might be in for a chilly time.

Keeping cosy

Most homes in Portugal are designed to keep the sun out, which is a wise move, but most are not built with insulation, so the cold seeps in during the winter months. Most homes do not have central heating either, so the

best you can do is layer up two or three items of clothing, and light a fire. Putting rugs down certainly helps, and pulling the curtains over does too - if they don't keep the drafts out, they will make it look warmer at the very least.

Log fires, wood or pellet burners and oil-filled radiators work well in a small room, but a modern villa has wide open rooms with high ceilings very hard to keep warm, and somewhere in my collection of winter clothes there is a lovely warm chipmunk onesie I was inspired to buy a few years ago - I would die of embarrassment if someone called round one evening and caught me unawares while wearing it – I look like the winner of the booby prize in a fancy dress competition – but boy, is it warm. And funnily enough, my dog thinks so too, as suddenly my lap is irresistible of an evening. And as for the pool – well it might just as well have ice on the surface, it feels that cold, and I am not going in! Wild swimming? You can keep it, if it feels anything like the numbing water in my backvard.

I would love to give you some little pearls of wisdom about keeping warm this winter, but I don't have the answers. Electric blanket, a hot water bottle (or two), heaters, wood or pellet fires, pile on the extra blankets- and even my unlikely onesie all do it for me. But there is one remedy I can guarantee will make you forget about the cold – a couple of glasses of Medronho (Portugal's own firewater) will go a long way to take your mind off things! Roll on the spring!





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Celebrating butter

Every now and again, chef James Martin's mum would let him make his own packed lunch – and on those occasions, he knew exactly what was going in his Spider-Man lunchbox.



I'd have buttered white sliced bread and mashed up banana with a Cadbury Flake on it, press it down, wrap it in cling film," he remembers fondly. "Then you get to lunchtime and it would sort of look – when it was out the cling film – almost like a tennis ball. It would be all congealed together. But you managed to eat it. Nobody wanted to swap with me, but it was proper."

Several decades on, this is a Yorkshireman who puts butter on roast potatoes (specifically when they're "not cold", but lukewarm) and has now written a whole cookbook devoted to the yellow stuff, simply titled Butter.

"People just think butter is butter, and it's not," he says, explaining how different butters suit certain types of cooking. "If you're going to do French-style patisserie, you just don't use the stuff you get in the supermarket – it's too heavily watered, and there's too much water in buttermilk. Really, really good pastry butter should snap in half like a Dairy Milk."

Try some of these new recipes celebrating butter.

Crispy buttermilk chicken with chipotle dressing

Ingredients: (serves 4-6) 12 chicken thighs, skinned and boneless 500ml buttermilk Vegetable oil, for deepfrying Fine sea salt For the seasoned flour: 300g self-raising flour 2tsp celery salt 2tsp dried oregano 2tsp cayenne pepper ½tsp ground nutmeg 3tsp garlic salt 3tsp onion salt 2tsp dried thyme 1tsp freshly ground black For the chipotle dressing:

1tbsp Dijon mustard
3 egg yolks
200ml vegetable oil
1tbsp chipotle chilli paste
To serve:

A few sprigs of coriander and mint, chopped 1 red and 1 green chilli,

2 limes, cut into wedges *Method:*

1. Place the chicken in a large bowl or container and coat in the buttermilk. Cover and pop in the fridge overnight.

2. The next day, heat a pan of vegetable oil or a deep-fat fryer to 170°C (338°F).
3. Mix the flour together with all the spices in a shallow bowl. Drain the chicken from the buttermilk and dredge it through the seasoned flour, coating each

piece well.

4. Fry the chicken in batches for six to eight minutes until golden and crispy, then drain on kitchen paper.

5. To make the chipotle dressing, whisk together the mustard and egg yolks. Slowly drizzle in the oil, whisking continuously until you have a thick dressing, then whisk in the chipotle

6. To serve, pile the chicken onto a platter, drizzle over the chipotle dressing and sprinkle the herbs and chillies over the top. Dot with lime wedges for squeezing.

Roast crab with lime and chilli butter

Ingredients: (serves 2) 100g butter, softened zest and juice of 2 limes 2 kaffir lime leaves, finely sliced

1 lemongrass stick, finely chopped

4 spring onions, sliced 2tbsp fresh coriander, chopped, plus extra leaves to serve

1 red chilli, finely diced 300g white crab meat Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

To serve:
Toasted sourdough
Method:

1. Preheat the oven to 200 °C (180 °C fan)/400 °F/ gas 6.

2. Beat together the butter, lime zest and juice, kaffir lime leaves, lemongrass, spring onions, coriander and chilli. Season with salt and pepper.

3. Spoon the crab into two ovenproof dishes and top with the butter. Place them

on a baking tray and roast for 10 minutes until hot and bubbling. 4. Sprinkle with coriander

4. Sprinkle with coriander leaves and serve straight away, with toasted sourdough on the side.

Filo croustades of figs, almonds and clotted cream

Ingredients: (Serves 4) Plain flour, for dusting 8 sheets of filo pastry 80g butter, melted, plus extra for greasing 80g caster sugar 75g flaked almonds, toasted 4tbsp clotted cream 4 ripe figs, stems trimmed and crossed to press open 2tbsp honey To serve: 200g clotted cream Method: 1. Preheat the oven to 170°C (150°C fan)/325°F/

Method:

1. Preheat the oven to

170°C (150°C fan)/325°F/
gas 3 and grease four 10
centimetre tart tins, one and
a half centimetres deep.
2. On a lightly floured
surface, cut out 12×12
centimetre squares from
the filo pastry. From the
remaining pastry, cut out
eight discs, using a five
centimetre round cutter.
3. Brush one filo disc
with melted butter on one
side and place it butterside down into a tart tin.
Lightly brush three of the

filo squares on both sides with melted butter, then cut them in half into triangles. Arrange the triangles evenly on the disc like petals, then seal them with another filo disc on top (this will ensure light, flaky and crisp croustades). Repeat to assemble the remaining three tart shells.


4. Bake the tarts for eight to 10 minutes until crisp and golden, then carefully place them on a wire rack to cool. Remove from the tins once cool.

5. Put the sugar in a non-stick frying pan over a medium heat; do not stir but carefully swirl in the pan until the sugar is brown and caramelised. This should take about three to four minutes. Toss in the almonds to coat them. 6. Place a dollop of clotted cream into each filo shell, add a fig, top with a scattering of caramelised almonds and drizzle with honey. Serve topped with a dollop of clotted cream.

Because November is blue month - let's promote the prevention of prostate cancer

All men are at risk for developing prostate cancer and the most common risk factor is age, while some are at an increased risk of developing the disease. If you are African-American or have a family history of prostate cancer you are at an increased risk for getting or dying from prostate cancer.

or some men, inherited genetic factors may put them at higher risk of prostate cancer if:

- You have more than one first-generation relative (father, son, or brother) who had prostate cancer, including three generation relatives on your mother's or father's side of the family.
- You were diagnosed with prostate cancer when you were 55 years old or younger.
- You were diagnosed with prostate cancer, and other members of your family have been diagnosed with breast, ovarian or pancreatic cancer.

Different people have different symptoms of prostate cancer. Some men do not have symptoms at all. If you have any of the following symptoms, be sure to see your doctor right

- Difficulty starting to urinate
- Weak or interrupted flow of urine
- Frequent urination, especially at night • Difficulty emptying the blad-
- der completely · Pain or burning during uri-
- nation
- Blood in the urine or semen • Pain in the back, hips or pelvis that doesn't go away
- Painful ejaculation

Keep in mind that these symptoms may be caused by conditions other than prostate cancer.

Cancer screening means looking for cancer before it causes symptoms. The goal of screening for prostate cancer is to find cancers that may be at high risk

for spreading if not treated, and to find them early before they spread.

There is no standard test to screen for prostate cancer. Two tests that are commonly used are: a blood test called a Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) and a rectal examination. PSA is a substance contained in the prostate and the levels of PSA in the blood can be higher in men with prostate cancer. Other conditions that affect the prostate may also result in elevated PSA

The recommendations for prostate cancer screening are:


Men who are 55 to 69 years old should decide to be screened for prostate cancer with a prostate specific antigen (PSA) test.

- Men who are 70 years old and older should not be screened for prostate cancer routinely.

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Get portion-wise



ccording to The British Nutrition Foundation (BNF), on average, we're eating 200-300

calories more than we need every day.

New BNF research found 41 percent of people tend to finish everything on their plate, even if they're full. And while more than three-quarters (78 percent) of those surveyed said they have portion sizes on their mind when preparing and A healthy balanced diet isn't just about what you eat, it's about portion size too – and it can be surprisingly easy to consume too much.

serving meals, 20 percent serve themselves large portions at mealtimes, to make sure they don't feel hungry afterwards.

To help make it easier for people to understand what a healthy-sized amount looks like, without having to go to the trouble of weighing everything, the BNF has launched updated guidance.

"We want to remind people that eating a healthy diet isn't just about what we eat, but also how much we're putting on our plates," says Sara Stanner, science director at the BNF. "Most of us will eat more when given bigger portions, so having portion sizes appropriate for our need is important. The aim of the portion size measures in our guide is to give people a quick way to estimate sensible portions, without having to get out the weighing scales.'

Here's a look at what the portion size measures include...

Fruit: About a handful or more. Vegetables: About 3 serving spoons or more

Fruit and vegetable portions are based on the 80g portions for 5 a Day. "For fruits and vegetables, the main message is to eat more," stresses Stanner. "Usually, you can eat big portions of these for relatively few calories, so filling your plate with plenty of vegetables or having fruit-based puddings is a great way to have satisfying portion sizes for fewer calories." She recommends

including a variety of different fruit and vegetables, and points out that frozen and canned veg are still nutritious choices.

Cereal: About 3 handfuls

Around three handfuls of breakfast cereal is about 40g, which is around 200 calories with half a glass of semiskimmed milk added, explains Stanner. "Government guidance suggests having about 400 calories for breakfast, based on a calorie need of 2,000 calories a day," she says. "So, you could choose to have a larger portion of cereal where your calorie needs are higher, or if you're not having anything else for breakfast.' It's best to choose wholegrain cereals with a lower sugar content, and add fresh or dried fruit to help with your 5 a Day, she suggests.

Dried rice or pasta: About 2 handfuls

It can be difficult to cook the right amount of pasta and rice, as they expand when cooking. Allowing about two handfuls per person is a good place to start, but you can adapt this depending on who you are cooking for, advises Stanner. For spaghetti, she suggests using your finger and thumb to make a hole the size of a £1 coin and allowing a portion this size per person.

Chicken breast: About the size of your whole hand

A portion of grilled chicken breast about the size of your hand is approximately 120g and about 180 calories – although obviously this depends on the size of your hand, says Stanner. If you're using chicken in a stir-fry or curry for example, you may find you need less as you'll be including other ingredients.

Steak: About the size of your palm

For a lean grilled rump steak, this portion is about 130g and roughly 310 calories, says Stanner. Government advice is to keep to about 70g per day on average of red and processed meat, which is about 500g per week. "You don't have to cut out red meat to have a healthy diet – it's a source of important minerals such as iron and zinc," she says. "But it's a good

idea to shift towards having more plant-based sources of protein."

Dried lentils: About 2 handfuls

Two handfuls of dried lentils is about 50g, which equates to around 120g cooked weight. With canned lentils or other pulses, this is equivalent to half a standard can. "We're recommended to include more beans and lentils in the diet, as they're naturally low in fat and provide protein and fibre," says Stanner. "Choosing more plant-based sources of protein is also one way to make our diets more sustainable for the planet."

Nuts and seeds: About the amount you can fit in your palm

Nuts and seeds are nutrient rich but also high in calories, so it's a good idea to be aware of your portion sizes if you're concerned about your weight. Stanner says the amount that fits in your palm is about 20g and provides 113-137 calories.

Cheddar cheese: About the size of your two thumbs together

Stanner says: "You may find you don't always want to stick to the portion sizes suggested – for example, if you're a cheese lover and occasionally want to have more than two thumbs' worth. But be aware that, depending on your needs, regularly eating large portions can make it more difficult to avoid weight gain."

Yoghurt: 1 individual pot or about 4 tablespoons

Dairy foods such as yoghurt are important sources of calcium and other nutrients. A portion from an individual pot of yoghurt or 4 tablespoons is about 120g and, for plain low-fat versions, provides about 68 calories. Ŝtanner says: "It's best to go for dairy foods that are green or amber (low or medium) for fat on food labels, as these provide the important nutrients for fewer calories and less saturated fat." For plant-based alternatives to dairy foods, look for items fortified with calcium and ideally other vitamins and minerals too. TPN/PA

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The healing power of horses



Equine therapy can have wonderful effects on children with special needs. Find out the power of horses and the happiness they can provide.

orses are lovely animals that have unique healing powers, don't you think? Equine therapy is well known and these activities with horses can improve physical, emotional and social wellbeing. By just simply being around horses can help to reduce stress and anxiety levels.

In these fun activities, kids learn how to manoeuver horses with the help and encouragement from experienced teachers. Actually, every time kids perform well, they will get a sense of accomplishment that automatically improves their wellbeing during the practice and after it.

Although the level of improvement always depends on each disability, in general equine therapy

reduces anxiety and stress, which will increase a child's self-esteem, self-acceptance and social skills. In addition, these children will be able to control their impulses more easily and gain communication and problem-solving skills.

At Quinta da Saudade, an equestrian centre in the Algarve, whose activity is mainly focused on promoting riding tours, I met Laurindo Fernandes, who also teaches kids with disabilities and dementia.

Laurindo is passionate about horses and has always lived surrounded by these beautiful animals. As a child "sometimes I used to ride horses to school. I've always loved horses", said the riding teacher.

That's why Laurindo has always worked with these animals and at a certain

stage he decided to start teaching children and helping them to overcome their fears. Without any degree or qualifications, his experience and innate talent are Laurindo's main tools.

With regard to fear, which is normal for those who have never experienced horses, Laurindo told me that after a while people begin to love riding. "These horses give you confidence," he said modestly. However, it is Laurindo with his calm and harmony that helps these people to get involved with animals, overcoming their fears.

"I've always been patient", he admitted. I always loved to study horses, adults and children. Besides, I have a lot of patience and, to do what I do, both with horses and children, I need to understand them, give them time and find a proper way to teach them".

Primarily, "I teach them to clean the horses slowly, to be careful and to put their feet on the horses. After a while, they start to learn. It's so good to see these little kids who didn't know anything before be able to learn how to ride a

the same for everyone, it will depend from child to child, but in general, at least ten lessons are needed, once a week, to enable a

> to ride. Furthermore, between the age of ten and twelve is the best age for children to start developing these faculties. However, Laurindo warned that unfortunately not all children are able to learn. "I do my best, but when the disabilities are too severe, it's complicated."

Through his eyes, we can see how proud he is of the progress these children have made in Laurindo's classes. "I like to see the kid's development - that makes me

very happy. It's a joy, it's like seeing a horse that doesn't know anything and after a while it gains confidence".


In fact, these children with special needs are capable of this and much more, they can do extraordinary things. This is said by Laurindo, who confesses



Energy poverty threatens Portuguese in the winter





f you haven't yet come across this term, energy poverty is the lack of access to efficient energy services, which negatively affects the well-being of people who cannot properly heat

"Energy poverty is a widespread problem across Europe, as between 50 and 125 million people are unable to afford proper indoor thermal comfort", reads the

Houses not prepared for the cold and rising electricity prices in Portugal worries the **European Commission.**

European Commission's website. In addition, Portugal is at the top of the countries in Europe where it is necessary to spend more energy on heating houses as the buildings are not well prepared for the cold. Perhaps that's why in Portugal it is cultural, accepted to be cold at home. A problem that DECO predicts could increase. DECO has been following the entire process of consumers' transition both at national and European level, anticipating some difficulties in this change given the current factors that directly affect this sector, namely "the increase in carbon prices, the increase in gas demand, economic recovery and delay in infrastructure maintenance during a pandemic". In fact, on 13 October, "the European Commission issued a statement suggesting to Member States a set of support and action measures to face a possible increase

in energy prices, such as provision

of limited-time compensation

measures and direct support to end users of energy; setting guarantees to avoid power grid disconnections; support the empowerment of consumers, providing them information on how they can take part in the energy market and have a stronger role in the energy supply chain from renewable sources and energy communities", among

According to DECO: "Many of these measures are linked to the work being developed under the STEP project - Solutions to Combat Energy Poverty, which intends to set an accessible and creative model of measures to combat energy poverty. Thus, as a reinforcement of the measures announced by the European Commission, the lifetime STEP, among others, the need for greater flexibility in the payment of energy bills; reduction of energy tax through VAT or use of the rate determined in the Energy Taxation Directive; better control

of the energy market by energy regulators.

Therefore, DECO stated that the intervention of supervisory bodies, municipalities, agents and associations is urgently needed in order to develop measures in order to reduce situations of energy poverty in Portugal. However, it is important to

remember that consumer choices and behaviour are essential to reduce the value of the bill. In addition, DECO's Energy Advice Office (GAE) offers personalised advice on how you can improve the energy performance of your homes and how to better manage energy consumption, as well as measures to save on bills.

Combating Childhood Obesity

In Portugal, obesity affects one in every three children, according to recent results from the child nutrition surveillance system - COSI.

COSI Portugal said that 82.4 percent of children consume, up to three times a week, chips, puff pastry and popcorn, 80.0 percent eat cookies/ biscuits, cakes and donuts and 71.3 percent consume

These foods are high in saturated fat, sugar or salt and since 2019 have been the target of restriction in food advertising aimed at children less than 16 years of age, "so this data reinforces the importance

of evaluating the outcomes achieved", said DECO.

Many institutions, including the World Health Organization, recognise the strong influence that the promotion of unhealthy foods has on children's eating behaviours. This phenomenon is aggravated by the time children and young people spend watching TV or using a computer, tablet or smart phone, which is associated with greater exposure to the powerful food marketing tactics used in the digital world, according to COSI Portugal.

In this sense, DECO points out some measures to follow in order to help kids:

- Control the sale of foods high in saturated fats, salt and sugar to children in a digital environment, calling for quick intervention by the responsible entities
- Creation of support plans for education and food literacy, in order to empower citizens to make more informed choices. In this regard, over the years DECO has been trying to educate consumers showing that it is possible to make healthier choices, from a nutritional point of view, but also cheaper and more sustainable, within the scope of the DECOJovem and DECOForma programmes.
- · Regional and local development to promote healthy eating, calling for the involvement of local authorities.
- Paying attention to the area of nutrition in Health Care, in order to increase responsiveness in the area of nutritional assessment and dietary counselling as a lifelong health management strategy.





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
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Basic design principles for creating a beautiful modern home

Design guru Matt Gibberd explains that using space, light, materials, nature and decoration cleverly will help make a home gorgeous.



Having a beautiful home has never felt more important than during the past 18 months when we've been forced to spend more time inside our own four walls – and you may have longed to transform yours into a beautiful modern living space.

But if a lack of know-how or limited finances held you back, it's not too late to get started. For design guru Matt Gibberd insists it can be easy to create a gorgeous home without spending a fortune, just by implementing simple design principles.

Gibberd, who is a founding director of the design-led estate agency The Modern House, has just written the book A Modern Way to Live, in which he outlines the five principles and how to best use them to create a beautiful home.

Here he gives us a taste of exactly how to do it...

Space

Gibberd explains that when a home combines both space and "refuge" areas it can help make occupants feel settled. He suggests: "Try to create an open and bright space for socialising, and a womb-like space for retreating and sleeping. Even in a studio flat, creating different zones using a curtain, sliding partition or bookcase on castors can greatly enhance the experience of occupying the space."

You can create the illusion of space with mirrors and reflective surfaces, he says, by using natural niches for built-in cupboards, and continuing the same material from inside to out. Consider re-hanging doors the other way around to open up rooms, and place radiators beneath windows to free-up valuable wall space for furniture.

Ligh

Gibberd says it's better to consider fixed glazing with a conventional door alongside, rather than bifold doors. "A picture window – free of obtrusive handles and mechanisms – does a better job of framing the views and looks more beautiful because the structural supports are hidden," he explains.

He suggests avoiding Roman blinds and pelmets, and hanging curtains from extra-wide poles so they can be pulled back to reveal the full window. And think about how the light moves around your home. "Sitting areas benefit from the enhanced light of a south-facing window," explains Gibberd, "whereas parts of the home that are seldom used, such as utility rooms, are best placed on the northern side. The eastern side is ideal for sleeping, and dining spaces work well on the western side, where they capture the radiant embers of the day.'

But although light is crucial for a home, Gibberd says householders shouldn't be afraid of the dark either. "Without areas of contrast, our homes would be one-dimensional and monotonous," he explains. "If you walk down a shadowy corridor, for example, when you arrive at a sun-soaked space it feels all the more bright and uplifting."

Materials

Gibberd says householders should think carefully about the things they

come into physical contact with every day, including light switches, door handles or kitchen worktops. "Are these as tactile as they should be?" he asks, pointing out that natural materials will always age more gracefully than man-made plastics and laminates. "Try to preserve original materials wherever possible, as they tell the individual story of a building and induce less anxiety than new ones," he advises.

Gibberd suggests living in a home for at least a year before making any changes. "For example, that wooden floor you thought was a bit beaten-up when you moved in might start to take on some significance – its warmth beneath bare feet, or its ability to absorb the comings and goings of daily life."

Natural materials like marble and glazed tiles have a gentle sheen and are easy to keep clean, he says, and clay is a moisture-absorbing alternative to conventional plaster.

Nature

A connection to nature is vital for wellbeing, so even those who are looking for somewhere to live in a city should try to find a flat that overlooks a communal garden, or has deep window ledges that can hold plants, suggests Gibberd.

If you're lucky enough to have outdoor space, he suggests combining borders of shrubs and flowers with decking, compacted gravel, flint, stone setts or herringbones of brick. And inside, stock up on the greenery. "Indoor plants positively impact our wellbeing, lowering blood pressure and increasing attentiveness, but they can also serve a practical purpose, helping to demarcate space, provide screening, absorb sound or add a flourish to an unremarkable room," says Gibberd.


Decoration

Instead of fitted carpets, Gibberd suggests trying loose-laid natural floor coverings such as sisal and jute, with a gap between the edging and the wall. Use rugs in layers and let them fill the natural spaces between furniture

And to avoid making an interior feel one-dimensional, he says it can be a good idea to mix furniture and objects from different eras and places. "Rather than putting a set of matching chairs around the kitchen table, for example, throw a bench or a wobbly Windsor chair into the mix," he suggests.

And finally, he adds: "When choosing what to buy for your home, try to follow your instincts rather than any preconceived notions about what constitutes good taste. Many of the best things have not been celebrated on Instagram, can't be found in textbooks, and don't cost a great deal. Often they have an accidental beauty that's the result of fulfilling utilitarian

The last three European places for the 2022 World Cup will be disputed in March by the 10 runners-up of the groups of the first phase and by two teams from the League of Nations.



Miguel Oliveira already looking to 2022

Portuguese rider Miguel Oliveira (KTM) has stated that he is already "motivated to start working on the 2022 bike" after finishing 14th in the last race of the 2021 season, at the Gran Premio de la Comunitat Valenciana.

Oliveira said that it had been "a complicated race", since starting "from 20th position brought many difficulties".

With all things considered he said that "finishing in the points is a positive result of the champion-ship", since 14th place is equivalent to two more points in the championship.

Despite this result Miguel Oliveira guaranteed that he is "far from being happy with the performance of these past two months" but he confessed that he was "motivated to start working on the 2022 bike next week", in order to find "more consistency" that allows him to "fight for good positions in more races".

The rider from Almada concluded the MotoGP World Championship in 14th place, with 94 points.

Throughout 2021 he added a win (in the Catalunya GP) and two second places (in the German GP and the Italian GP) as the best results of a year marked by five withdrawals due to crashes.

Portugal thrash Cyprus

The Portuguese football team have successfully managed to maintain its 100 percent winning record in qualifying for the European Under-21 Championship, by beating Cyprus at home, 6-0, in a Group D game.

Gonçalo Ramos, with a hat-

Gonçalo Ramos, with a hattrick, at 6, 53 and 61 minutes, Gonçalo Inácio (21), Fábio Vieira (51) and Henrique Araújo (71) scored the goals, giving the team their fifth victory in Group D, in a match in which Fábio Silva also missed a penalty (29).

With this win, Portugal went on to add 15 points, one more than Greece, who have one more game, with Cyprus and Iceland having seven and Belarus three, while Liechtenstein has yet to score.

Ajax suspends ticket sales for Sporting match

Ajax has suspended ticket sales for upcoming games due to a partial lockdown to combat the Covid-19 pandemic, a measure that could affect the match with Sporting in the Champions League.

"The new measures announced also affect football. As it is still uncertain how the matches will be played, because of this Ajax decided to stop selling tickets", wrote the Dutch club on its official website.

The partial lockdown was decreed for a period of three weeks and, if not renewed, will not be in force on 7 December, the date of the visit of the Portuguese champions to Amsterdam for the sixth and final round of group C of the Champions League.

The Dutch team, who in the first round won 5-1 in Alvalade, explained that the sale of tickets for the game against Sporting "can be resumed as soon as more details are known about the lockdown measures".

"If the match is played without an audience, the ticket holders will be refunded", clarified the club, which has suspended the sale of tickets for matches over the next three weeks.







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
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
