Portugal is 'in the premier league' of olive oil production and could soon reach the "top three" thanks to the growth in its production capacity.



There are projects in all countries, currently, to improve their production capacity", but, with "the growth rate it has had" and the existing forecasts, Portugal "is clearly in the premier league" of olive oil producing countries,

said the executive director of the International Olive Council (IOC), Jaime Lillo. Jaime Lillo told Lusa that he was confident that Portugal would soon be "on the podium of the three production champions". An IOC delegation has been

visiting Portugal to gain first-hand knowledge of the reality of olive oil mills and olive oil production in the country, particularly in the Alentejo region.

Hosted by OLIVUM - the Portuguese Association of Olive Growers and Olive Oil Mills, the programme kicked off with a meeting in Beja, which was also attended by the Portuguese Farmers' Confederation (CAP), CONFAGRI - the National Confederation of Agricultural Cooperatives and Agricultural Credit of Portugal and Casa do

Visits to olive groves, olive oil mills and the Alqueva Development and Infrastructure Company (EDIA), as well as presentations of research and educational projects,

are the highlights of this two-day technical visit.

Jaime Lillo, who is completing his first year as executive director of the IOC, explained to Lusa that he had "a particular interest in visiting Portugal", which produces "excellent quality" olive oils, and, in particular, the Alentejo. This is because, in world terms, the Alentejo "is one of the regions, if not the most innovative, most competitive region and where a real revolution has taken place in the cultivation" of olive groves, he stressed. "What is happening in the Alentejo is an international reference for modern olive growing, competitive, precision olive growing and, in addition, sustainable and high-quality olive



Tourism needs immigrant workforce



The president of the Portuguese Tourism Confederation has highlighted the need for a foreign workforce and considered that, even if immigrants were replaced by beneficiaries of the Social Integration Income (RSI), "it would not be

Francisco Calheiros was one of the speakers at Chega's parliamentary sessions, in a panel on the theme "Boosting the Portuguese economy".

"The lack of workforce is a reality. It has been overcome by immigration, and I think there is no other way to do it", he

The president of the Portuguese Tourism Confederation considered it necessary "to create conditions for them to come, so that there are no endless queues for services, so that they have housing, employment contracts and so that they can have all the conditions to be integrated, as the Portuguese want them to be".

In the same panel, Chega MP Filipe Melo did not agree with this position.

'We do not need immigrants to end the lack of labour, what we need is to end the RSI, to put those who are receiving [this subsidy] to work, and thus not need immigrants", he stated, arguing that "this is the prerequisite for the economy to function".

In a second intervention, the president of the Portuguese Tourism Confederation refuted: "we can put all the people who receive the RSI [in jobs now occupied by immigrants], but it is not enough".

New immigrant centre processing 240 people per day

The Minister of the Presidency has said that the first immigrant service centre of the AIMA Mission Structure should serve around 240 people per day, which represents an additional 25 percent of response capacity.



ntónio Leitão Amaro visited the facilities of the first service centre of the Mission Structure of the Agency for Integration, Migration and Asylum (AIMA), which began operating on 9 September at the Hindu Centre in Lisbon, and which is a first step towards regularising the cases of around 400,000 immigrants by June 2025.

According to the minister, the estimated number of people served is 240 people per day during this first week.

"This means, on top of the 1,000 [services] normally provided by AIMA across its network," the minister stressed. According to Leitão Amaro, this represents a 25 percent increase in the organisation's response capacity.

"We expect to increase significantly each week over the next few weeks," he said, explaining that the expectation is to serve "almost twice as many people" by the end of September and during the month of

The Minister of the Presidency stressed that the only people who are unable to complete their service process are those who do not present all the necessary documentation. He added that those who do not present their passport cannot even begin the process, while in the event of any other missing documentation, the immigrant will have the right to reschedule the appointment.



"Waiting"

Leitão Amaro stressed that the service centre was created to serve "foreign citizens who have been waiting and despairing, in some cases for several years, for the Portuguese State to respond to a request in accordance with the law."

"This is the first service centre that will resolve a very heavy legacy, but above all a serious failure by the Portuguese State towards 400,000 foreign citizens", he pointed out.

He took the opportunity to clarify that this service centre verifies that "the requirements of Portuguese law are met" and, through this, ensures that "those who comply with Portuguese rules and

laws" live in Portugal.

"Criminal records are checked, employment relationships are checked, and the legal requirements for working legally in Portugal are checked", he stated, stressing that this is a "very complex operation", involving around 120 people, including AIMA employees and volunteers from various civil society organisations.

Regarding the upcoming service centres, which will open in various parts of the country, Leitão Amaro said that "they are in an advanced stage of finalisation and regulation", some of them in partnership with local authorities, and that they should start operating throughout the month.

UK border rules announced



Portuguese citizens who wish to visit the United Kingdom will need an Electronic Travel Authorisation, a document that will become mandatory for Europeans from April 2025.



ccording to the British Government, the system

involves registering personal and biometric data in advance digitally, through an application,

and paying a fee of £10 (€12).

The authorisation may take up to three days

and will be valid for two years, during which time multiple visits to the United Kingdom of up to six months in length may be made.

After an experimental phase with some Arab countries that began in 2023, the system will be extended to all visitors who do not require a prior visa for short stays. Visitors from non-European countries such as the United States, Brazil, Macau or Argentina will be able to apply from 27 November and will need to have an Electronic Travel Authorisation (ETA) from 8 January.

European tourists, includ-

ing those from Portugal, will be able to apply from 5 March, and it will be mandatory for anyone who is visiting the UK from 2 April 2025.

British nationals living abroad, as well as foreign nationals living in the Republic of Ireland, are exempt as they are part of a common travel area with the UK.

The ETA may be rejected on the grounds of a criminal record or risk, for example, of terrorism. The British Home Office said that this measure is part of the aim to digitalise the UK's border and immigration system. "Digitalisation enables a

smooth experience for the millions of people who cross the border every year," said Home Secretary Seema Malhotra. This system does not apply to holders of residence permits, such as those registered in the EU Settlement Scheme (EUSS) opened after Brexit, workers with visas or students.

The UK system is similar to those used by countries such as the US, Canada, Australia and New Zealand and to the European Travel Information and Authorisation System (ETIAS) which the EU aims to have in place by the first half of 2025.

Flu and Covid-19 vaccination campaign

The autumn-winter 2024-2025 seasonal vaccination campaign will begin on 20 September in the National Health Service (SNS) health units and in pharmacies.

The most common reasons behind vaccine resistance are beliefs in lack of efficacy, fear of side effects and the need for more information.

In a statement, the DGS says it has published the rules for the seasonal vaccination campaign against flu and Covid-19, which define the eligible groups, the vaccines to be used, the vaccination schedules and the technical procedures associated with vaccination.

The entity reveals that, in the

SNS health units, vaccination is recommended and free of charge for people aged 60 or over, professionals and users/residents of residential structures for the elderly (ERPI), and the National Network of Integrated Continuing Care (RNCCI) and people with risk pathologies.

Vaccination in SNS units is also recommended for pregnant women and professionals in health services (public and private) and other health care services, students on clinical placements, firefighters involved in transporting patients, caregivers of dependent people and pharmaceutical distribution professionals, homeless people and prisons.

In community pharmacies, vaccination is recommended for users between 60 and 84 years of age and health professionals in pharmacies.

"Booster vaccination with a new dose of the flu and COVID-19


vaccine each autumn-winter season (when the circulation of respiratory viruses is most intense) is essential to prevent infections by these viruses that result in serious illness, hospitalisation and death, significantly reducing the burden on health services", highlights the DGS.

For the 2024-2025 campaign, the DGS stresses that "sufficient flu and Covid-19 vaccines have been purchased for all eligible individuals who show an interest in being vaccinated".

This year, the booster dose of the flu vaccination will be extended to people aged 85 or over, in addition to people living in ERPI, similar institutions and the national network of integrated continuing care (RNCCI).

The Government will spend €7.6 million on vaccination against Covid-19 and flu in pharmacies and wants to have more people vaccinated by the end of November.



Immigrant students up by 160 percent



The number of immigrant students in Portuguese schools has increased by 160 percent over the last five years.



Between 2018/19 and 2023/24, we have seen an increase of more than 160 percent in immigrants in primary and secondary education", revealed the Minister of Education, Science and Innovation (MECI), Fernando Alexandre, during the presentation of the OECD report "Education at a Glance 2024".

In 2019, there were around 53,000 foreign students in Portuguese schools, representing 5.3 percent of the total number of students enrolled. Last year, there were already 140,000, representing 13.9 percent of the total number

of students, according to data from the OECD report.

"This is one of the major challenges in Education," announced the minister, highlighting that the downward trend in the number of students in Portuguese schools was interrupted with the arrival of these foreign children and young people.

In the last two years alone, more than 70,000 new students were enrolled: 39,500 in 2022/2023 and 33,500 last year.

"More than 30,000 foreign students enter our education system every year, and they are all

over the country. This poses immense challenges for us," acknowledged the minister, who said that "very soon" measures will be announced to ensure that schools have the tools to deal with this new reality.

Currently, 14 percent of primary and secondary school students are foreigners and behind this national average there are local realities, such as in Lisbon or the Algarve, where "the average is much higher", he said.

Among the main challenges for teachers is the fact that around 25 to 30 percent of these new students do not speak Portuguese, acknowledged the minister, who argued that the arrival of these students should be seen as "a good problem".

"It would be tragic and depressing to continue closing classrooms and schools", he said, stressing that Portugal has no future without immigration.

"The integration of immigrants is essential for the functioning of our economy, but above all for our society to remain cohesive. The integration of these people depends on education and begins with the children of these immigrants. If we fail in education, we will fail in our migration policy", concluded the minister, during the presentation of the OECD annual report.

Algarve occupancy up in August

Algarve hotels recorded a 1.0 percent increase in room occupancy in August, compared to last year, to 89.3 percent.


According to provisional data released by the Algarve Hotels and Tourist Resorts Association (AHETA), the occupancy rate of Algarve accommodation units in August was 0.9 percentage points (pp) higher than a year earlier, having risen from 88.4 percent in 2023 to 89.3 percent this year.


According to the monthly summary of hotel developments prepared by this association, the markets that recorded the highest year-on-year growth were Germany (+1.2pp), North America (+0.5pp), and The Netherlands (+0.4pp).

The biggest drops compared to August 2023 were recorded in the national market (-3.6pp) and in the French market (-0.5pp).

The average stay was 4.8 nights, a decrease of 0.2 compared to the same month of the previous year.

The longest average stays were in the Dutch market (7 nights) and the Irish market (6).

21% more time lost in traffic



The president of the Institute for Mobility and Transport (IMT) believes that the capacity of public transport in Portugal "is well below its potential", due to "a lack of qualifications in the sector" and public and private investment.



There is no way to make the technological and energy transition in the transport sector until we have qualified professionals in public entities", stated João Jesus Caetano, quoted in a note from the organisation, considering that this shortage, being widespread, "is particularly relevant in intermunicipal communities".

The average speed of public transport is decreasing in Portugal, especially in the metropolitan areas of Lisbon and Porto, with Lisbon being one of the most congested European cities, accord-

ing to data from IMT. In the statement, the organisation that manages public road transport also adds that the city of Lisbon has "the eighth worst speed in Europe: 18 km/hour in the last section". The speed limit is measured in the last stretch (variably defined) of the route entering a city (in English this extension is referred to as the 'last mile', although it is not a mile).

In 2023, the number of hours lost in traffic by Portuguese people per year, according to the institute, "increased by 21 percent compared to the figures for 2019, the pre-pandemic year".

To meet the need for more skilled professionals, IMT and ISCTE - Instituto Universitário de Lisboa, in partnership with the universities of Porto and Minho, will launch the Mobilidade do Futuro postgraduate course at the end of September. 'The active involvement of IMT in this training aims to provide an update of skills to professionals in the public sector who perform mobility planning and management functions, as well as to professionals in the private sector who are central to mobility transitions and their sustainability", stated João Jesus Caetano.

Lisbon Metro returns homes to residents

Lisbon Metro has completed the reinforcement works on the houses in Travessa do Pasteleiro, subject to interventions as part of the construction of the new Santos station.

In a statement, Metropolitano de Lisboa revealed that it has begun to deliver back to residents the units located in Travessa do Pasteleiro, which were occupied for 16 months for structural reinforcement works

According to the railway transport company, the works took place in a group of units at Travessa do Pasteleiro n.º 26 to 34 and n.º 38 to 44, as well as the public area accessible from Av. D. Carlos I, nº 85, to carry out structural reinforcement works on that building, with the costs of these

interventions being borne by Metropolitano de Lisboa, in accordance with the Expropriations Code.

According to Metro, the majority of these buildings "had precarious or non-existent structures and foundations", and the works created "new structural elements in the buildings, improving the safety of people and goods, giving greater stability to the slope where those properties are located".

During the process, the company reports having compensated landlords, residents and owners in accordance with what is stipulated by law, based on the value determined by an independent evaluator from the Ministry of Justice list, with the consent of interested

parties, with the compensation totalling the value of €1.8 million.

The new Santos station was built as part of the expansion of the Yellow Line, part of the future Circular Metro Line.

Scheduled to open in the second half of 2025, the Circular line will connect the Rato station to Cais do Sodré, in an extension of another two kilometres of network and two new stations (Estrela and Santos), joining the current Yellow and Green lines into a new ring circular in the centre of Lisbon.

The metro operates daily with four lines: Yellow (Rato-Odivelas), Green (Telheiras-Cais do Sodré), Blue (Reboleira-Santa Apolônia) and Red (Airport-São Sebastião).

Lisbon Metro 7th best in Europe

The Lisbon Metro is the seventh best in Europe according to analysis by Bounce.

The analysis by Bounce, analysed several parameters, including the number of stations, Google reviews, and the number of passengers to evaluate the metro systems in several European capitals.

"Metro systems in European capitals are essential for navigating these historic cities, but the quality and accessibility of the facilities vary," reads a statement released by Bounce, which gives the example of the Paris metro in France, which is criticised for not having adequate facilities for people with reduced mobility.

In Bounce's assessment, the Lisbon Metro was ranked seventh, with an overall rating of 5.97 points, the same rating achieved by the

metro systems of Copenhagen, Denmark, and Bucharest, Romania.

The Lisbon Metro, which has a total of 56 stations, recorded 15 percent positive ratings but 22 percent negative ratings, and is the one with the highest score in this parameter within the Top 10, while Google's rating is 4.09 points.

The ranking presented by Bounce is led by the Oslo metro in Norway, which obtained an overall rating of 8.06 points, followed by the Sofia metro in Bulgaria, with a rating of 7.64 points. The Top 3 is completed by the Athens metro, with a rating of 7.29 points.

Also in the Top 10 of this ranking are the metros of Madrid (6.74 points), Warsaw (6.60 points), and London (6.04), with the Prague metro closing the list, with a rating of 5.83 points.



Portuguese universities in top 300 There are 6 Portuguese universities

among the 1,000 best in the world.



he ranking of the 1,000 best universities in the world in 2024 has been released. In first place is, once again, Harvard University, in the USA, followed by two other North American higher education institutions. This ranking also includes six Portuguese

universities, with the highest ranked being the University of Lisbon. At the top of the table that brings together the 1,000 best universities in the world is Harvard University, in the USA, being the highest ranked of all, as it was last year. Next in line are Stanford University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, both also in the USA, according to the 2024 Academic Ranking of World Universities. The top 10 of this ranking is dominated by North American universities, with two exceptions located in the United Kingdom: the University of Cambridge

and the University of Oxford, which are ranked 4th and 6th, respectively. There are also six universities in Portugal considered in this ranking. The highest ranked is the University of Lisbon, followed by the University of Porto, the University of Aveiro, the University of Coimbra and the University of Minho, which are ranked between 201 and 300. The NOVA University of Lisbon is the lowest ranked, ranked between 701 and

It should be recalled that the Academic Ranking of World Universities (ARWU) was first published in June 2003 by the Centre for World-Class Universities (CWCU), Graduate School of Education (formerly Institute of Higher Education) of Shanghai Jiao Tong University, China, and is updated annually.

Portuguese families lead in preschool spending

Portuguese families pay 33 percent of preschool education costs, which is higher than the financial effort made by families in the 38 OECD countries, despite the fact that this level of education is "free".

Portugal stands out in the educational landscape of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) with several peculiarities, revealing significant progress, but also persistent challenges, according to the latest report "Education at a Glance 2024" published by the OECD and presented this at the Thalia Theatre in Lisbon in the presence of the Minister of Education, Science and Innovation, Fernando Alexandre.

According to a report by ECO, one of the negative points highlighted by the report is related to the high weight that education costs have on family budgets. According to OECD experts, Portuguese families are the ones that contribute the most to bearing the costs of preschool education among the 38 OECD countries.

Despite this level of education being nominally free, Portuguese families continue to bear around a third of the total expenditure on this level of education, a figure surprisingly higher than their contribution to higher education (27 percent).

"In Portugal, despite pre-primary education being free, families continue to contribute 33 percent of the expenditure on this level, the highest among OECD countries, and more than their contribution to higher education (27 percent)", states the report.

This situation is mainly due to the costs associated with additional services such as meals, transport and extracurricular activities, which are not fully covered by public funding.

Real time public transport schedules



Carris Metropolitana has launched an application that provides passengers with realtime information about the schedules and occupancy of the company's buses.



he Carris Metropolitana 'App' was presented to journalists by those responsible for the application and the directors of Transportes Metropolitanos de Lisboa (TML), Faustino Gomes and Rui Lopo. The chairman of the board of directors of TML, Faustino Gomes, explained that the 'App' "is not a journey planner", but a

site where information is provided to passengers in order to "give them confidence to use Carris Metropolitana". Rui Lopo, a member of the board of directors of TML, explained that the 'App' will allow passengers to see, in real time, whether a Carris Metropolitana bus "is late and how full it is", putting "more pressure on operators to meet schedules" The application will also allow a search by stop and

by line (bus number), and personalised alerts and warnings can be set. For now, it will not be 100 percent available for blind users, and those responsible acknowledge the need to work on some details. Rui Lopo recalled that the company operates in 15 of the 18 municipalities in the Lisbon Metropolitan Area (except Lisbon, Cascais and Barreiro) and that the service "already reaches Vendas Novas".

"1,700 buses circulate per day, driven by 3,000 drivers and transporting 620,000 passengers/day normally, having reached 650,000 at peak times", said Rui Lopo, referring to passengers with valid tickets, acknowledging that there will be "many more" circulating on the 730 lines with 12,500 stops. The official added that by the end of the year, "demand is expected to be 20 percent higher than in 2019", adding that, currently, the numbers, after the peak with the introduction of the Navegante pass, mean that the operation is "above" the figures from that time. "It is expected to reach 165 million passengers transported by December of this year", he said, recalling that in 2023, 141 million passengers were transported and that, between January and July, there were municipalities that saw growth "above 30 percent". Faustino Gomes said that the goal is to include all operators [train, boats] in the application, which could happen "within two or three years", given that there is a working group and there has already been a joint application for a project.

Lisbon tuk tuk rules

Lisbon Municipal Assembly (AML) has approved a recommendation from PCP for the council to present, "as a matter of urgency", regulations on the circulation of tuk tuks, with rules for licensing and operation of this activity.

In a plenary meeting, the PCP recommendation was made possible with votes against from Chega and the non-registered deputy Margarida Penedo (who left CDS-PP) and votes in favour from the others, asking the council to provide the AML with "all the information it has on the licensing of this activity and the specific rules it intends to adopt regarding the operation of tuk tuk vehicles, as well as the deadlines foreseen for the application of these measures".

On 31 July, the Lisbon City Council (CML) announced its intention to limit the number of parking spaces for tuk tuks and the number of licenses to be issued for this type of vehicle, in order to regulate the activity in the city.

PCP's proposal recommends that CML inform the assembly about the result of the public consultation held on the draft regulation, approved by the council in December 2016, and present the current status of the municipal regulation on the circulation of vehicles used for tourist entertainment activities, including the timetable for its approval.



Regional Briefs



1. LisbonHeritage Prize

The Gulbenkian Heritage Prize - Maria Tereza e Vasco Vilalva, which is valued at 50 thousand euros, was given to the inventory and restoration project of the Brotéria Library in Lisbon. This year, there were 20 applications for the prize, which recognises interventions in movable and immovable culturally significant assets that encourage the protection and recovery of heritage.

2. Coimbra Community Garden

The University of Coimbra's Faculty of Psychology department will establish a community garden on the terrace of its main building with the goal of including the entire academic community in the process, the head of the department has shared. The project, which aims to involve students, staff, teachers, and researchers, is being carried out in partnership with a private company that has experience in creating community gardens.

3. Faro Research Grants

The European Research Council (ERC) has awarded two new grants to the University of Algarve's (Ualg) Archaeology Centre, reaching a value of 9.5 million euros over the past two years. The ERC has awarded 494 'starting grants' to young scientists and academics from all around Europe, whose projects are related with innovative research in a range of scientific areas and humanities

4. Moura, Beja School Centre

The municipal council has declared that the newly constructed Moura Volunteer Firefighters' School Centre, located in Beja's district, will open on 13 September following an expenditure of more than 3.7 million euros. The centre which focuses on pre-schooling and primary schooling will have a library, a laboratory, multipurpose rooms, covered and uncovered spaces, a teaching garden, among other features.

5. Salvaterra de Magos Municipal Museum

The 'Municipal Museum' housed in the Cais da Vala Real building which include nine parts detailing seven centuries of the municipality's history, has opened in Salvaterra de Magos, Santarém's district. The museum was established with the intention of producing a "simple and appealing" timeline of the municipality's development over the last 700 years, according to the mayor Hélder Esménio.

6. Almada, Setúbal School Refurbishment

With the opening of five new classrooms, the Maria Rosa Colaço Basic School in Almada, whose renovations have been officially inaugurated, will be able to accommodate 125 additional pre-school and first-cycle students. Improvements to the remaining spaces, including the kitchen, cafeteria, library, multipurpose activity room, outdoor area, recreation equipment and a new teachers' room were also part of the rehabilitation project.

7. Guarda Novel Research

The Instituto Politécnico da Guarda (IPG) has announced the creation of a new research unit that aims to encapsulate pharmaceuticals, specifically anti-inflammatory, anti-cancer, or anxiolytic medicinal compounds, using a byproduct of the paper industry. The Biotek SA company from Vila Velha de Ródão located in Castelo Branco's district, is collaborating with the Polytechnic team on the project named Bio-Ligne.

8. V. N. Cerveira, V. do Castelo Housing Investment

The Recovery and Resilience Plan (RRP) will fully fund the construction of six dwellings in Vila Nova de Cerveira at controlled costs, with an investment of around 700 thousand euros, the city council has stated. With a projected completion date of June 2026, the six affordable dwellings consist of two one-bedroom flats and four two-bedroom units.

9. Ponta Delgada, Azores Youth Initiative

According to its president, the Azores parliament will launch the youth route 'Azores with Future - Young people inspiring' this month in an effort to encourage younger people to stay in the archipelago. According to Luís Garcia, the initiative which will take place in the nine Azorian islands, begins on 23 September at Flores island's Basic and Secondary School.

Portuguese compliant investment bonds: a path to lower taxes?

ne of the most tax certain options for investors looking to reduce their tax burden is the Portuguese Compliant Investment Bonds (PCIB).

What is a PCIB?

This means that within the PCIB, investments can accumulate wealth more rapidly than if they were subject to annual taxation outside of this structure.

A Strategic Move for Homeowners

One of the standout features of PCIBs is their potential to reduce or eliminate capital gains tax when selling property in Portugal. Unlike in the UK,

where selling a primary residence often incurs no tax, Portugal applies capital gains tax to all property sales. Historically, the only means to avoid this tax was to reinvest in another EU property - a strategy rendered moot for UK properties post-Brexit. However, in 2019, the Portuguese government introduced a concession allowing individuals to bypass this tax by investing the proceeds from a property sale into an approved investment or pension structure, such as a PCIB. There are however certain qualifying conditions, the main ones being age 65+ or retired, the property being sold must be your main residence, and it has to be held by you personally (not through a company).

Other benefits

PCIBs offer a range of benefits beyond propertyrelated tax relief:

- 1. Lower Effective Tax Rates: When funds are withdrawn, only the growth portion is subject to tax. Additional tax reductions apply after five and eight
- 2. Post-NHR Flexibility: The favourable tax treatment of PCIBs is available to both Non-Habitual Residents (NHR) and regular Portuguese taxpayers, making them a versatile tool for long-term financial planning.
- 3. Control Over Tax Timing: PCIB holders can choose when to withdraw funds, enabling them to synchronise taxable events with periods of lower

- 4. Avoid the 53%+ capital gains tax trap – investments held for less than 12 months typically attract income tax rates of up to 53%. However, within a PCIB, buying and selling can occur without triggering immediate tax liabilities.
- 5. Investment flexibility and diversification -PCIBs accommodate a variety of currencies, asset classes, and investment strategies, offering a broad scope for portfolio diversification.
- 6. Simplified Tax Reporting: Tax and reporting obligations are only triggered when a withdrawal is made therefore simplifying the reporting process for bond holders.
- 7. International Portability: Recognised in many jurisdictions, PCIBs offer flexibility for those who may relocate, potentially eliminating the need to liquidate investments to start planning again. They are particularly tax efficient for UK residents allowing investors to potentially washout gains made whilst overseas.
- 8. Succession planning - investment bonds allow flexible and certain transfer of wealth to beneficiaries. This may not be possible with other investment types and the default

"forced heirship" provisions

under Portuguese law.


9. Inheritance tax savings - with the correct planning, holding wealth in an investment bond could mitigate UK inheritance for British domiciles and

strengthen a non-UK domicile claim.

10. Estate administration – In the event of the bondholder's death, the distribution of assets to beneficiaries can occur without the need for a lengthy probate process.

New PM

Italy



Fountain Fee

Rome is considering launching a ticketing system to enter one of its most iconic sites, in a bid to curb overtourism. Authorities in the Italian capital announced they want to start the scheme at the 18th-century Trevi Fountain, a famous bucket list destination, as part of ongoing plans to both reduce crowds and promote "sustainable tourism".

The Netherlands



Female Executives

The annual Female Board Index has revealed that women accounted for nearly one third of new appointments to management boards at the Netherlands 82 listed companies last year. Since 2022, a third of a company's supervisory board must consist of women, but there is no such law for management positions.

Norway



Forest Surge

According to a new report, Norwegian forests have tripled in size over the last century. In just 40 years, they doubled in size, due to higher levels CO₂ and warmer temperatures than in previous decades. Of the 47 million metric tons of CO₂ that Norway released into the atmosphere last year, 18 million were taken up by the forests.

Denmark



Recycled Plastic

LEGO has announced that it will invest to increase the amount of recycled plastic in its bricks to 50 percent by 2026. The company's CEO has stated its bottom line will suffer under the increased production costs of around 70 percent but hopes that their research will allow other companies using plastic to save in the long run with their innovations.

Poland



Chocolate Museum

Housed in the building shaped like a colossal chocolate bar, the new Wedel Chocolate Factory Museum in Warsaw promises to sweeten the city cultural landscape and take visitors on a sensory tour of Poland's oldest chocolate company. This €200 million investment, the biggest in the more than 170-year history of the company, allows visitors to taste and smell the array of confectionary.

Japan



Battery Subsidies

Japan has announced it will provide more subsidies for electric-vehicle battery production, pledging \$2.4 billion in support of projects by Toyota and other major companies, as it seeks to strengthen its battery supply chain. The government will support 12 projects for storage batteries and those for their parts, materials and production equipment by up to ¥350 billion.

Vietnam



Informatics Olympiad

Vietnam's national team, comprised of four students, has achieved a remarkable result at the 2024 International Olympiad in Informatics, ranking among the top four countries and territories in the overall medal standings, following the United States, Japan, and Poland. The team of students, all of whom secured medals, won two gold, one silver and one bronze.

Philippines



Solar Project

Actis, a London based investment house, has formalised its plants to fund \$600 million in the Philippines for the development of the country's largest single-site solar power project. The Terra Solar is a 3,500-megawatt solar power project with a 4,500-megawatt hour battery energy storage system that has been awarded by the Board of Investments.



Ryanair warns TAP will be "smaller" if bought by Lufthansa



Ryanair CEO Eddie Wilson has argued that "every airline that Lufthansa buys will be smaller in a few years' time", predicting that the same will happen with TAP if it is acquired by the German group.

ne of the things that the Germans are really good at is "extracting the maximum price from people", which is why they bought Brussels Airlines, Austrian Airlines and Swiss and never expanded, Wilson stressed, in statements to the Efe news agency. For the Ryanair leader, the Portuguese company has a good market in South America, especially in Brazil, and "Lufthansa can retain

some of that".

"They would be stupid not to do it, but the company will not grow and will be smaller", he warned.

Regarding the future of the Italian company ITA

Airways after its integration

into the German group, Eddie Wilson considered that they will initially establish more routes to Milan and Rome and then place them back in Lufthansa's hubs in Frankfurt and Munich. It is "a very simple business model": buy the airline for half of nothing, restrict capacity, increase prices, not compete on shorthaul flights and operate all long-haul traffic through Germany.

"So, unfortunately, the Italians will eat more sausages in Munich and Frankfurt," he said ironically.

On the other hand, for Wilson, the International Airlines Group (IAG) has

done "a good job", as when it bought Aer Lingus in Ireland, it made it a success, although it made it grow more as a long-haul airline than a short-haul airline. Just like what happened with British Airways, which became a long-haul carrier, it is therefore a group "focused on growth", he stressed. IAG owns several airlines, including Iberia and Vueling, and is the third largest operator in Spain. In addition to Lufthansa, IAG and Air France-KLM are also interested in privatising the Portuguese airline.

As for the possibility of Ryanair carrying out some kind of corporate operation in the future, the CEO of



the Irish low-cost airline refused to rule out this scenario.

Wilson explained, however, that he would prefer to add 50 Boeing aircraft to Ryanair's fleet rather than buy an airline with 50 aircraft.

"My preference is organic growth, but if there are opportunities, you always have to look for them," he added.

Ryanair believes that consolidation in the sector is a good thing and supports it because having fewer airlines "is more stable and is better for consumers in the long term," he assured.

Lisbon cruises announced

Next summer, Lisbon will once again be highlighted in the MSC Cruises schedule, which will offer 19 departures and arrivals to the Portuguese capital, between the end of April and November 2025.

According to MSC Cruises, 18 10-night cruises are planned on the MSC Musica, including stops in Genoa (Italy), Marseille (France), Malaga (Spain), Cádiz (Spain), Alicante, Mahón (Spain) and Olbia (Italy). In addition to the 18 10-night cruises, MSC Cruises also offers a 12-night itinerary, embarking and disembarking in Lisbon, starting on 28 October and stopping in Alicante, Mahon, Olbia, Genoa, Marseille, Barcelona, Malaga and Gibraltar, as well as two mini-cruises, one embarking in Lisbon and disembarking in Genoa and the other embarking in Genoa and disembarking in Lisbon. MSC Cruises indicates that, on these cruises, the special Cruise and Flights package is available, which includes



"the cruise, transfers, and flights to a wide range of destinations, so that guests know the exact cost of their holiday, without having to worry about extra costs".

Lisbon best MICE destination

Lisbon has won the award for Best MICE Destination in Europe at the 5th edition of the World MICE Awards.



he Portuguese capital beat the cities of Athens, Berlin, Istanbul, London, Madrid, Milan, Paris, and Vienna, which were also competing. The MICE (Meetings, Incentives, Conferences and Exhibitions) segment contributes significantly to tourism revenue and the consequent development of the city. The strategic location, modern and

versatile infrastructure. excellent access and diverse cultural offerings have consolidated Lisbon as one of the main European destinations for organising events.

The executive director of the Lisbon Tourism Association, Paula Oliveira, argues that winning this award "is recognition of the collective work to position Lisbon as a global reference destination, which contributes

significantly to the creation of revenue and jobs, as well as to the rehabilitation of heritage."

In a press release, ATL $\,$ reveals that, in 2023, 151 associative events were counted in the ICCA (International Congress and Convention Association) ranking, an organisation that monitors the holding of events worldwide. From 2019 to 2022, Lisbon has been ranked second in



黒栽県 | New private hospital opening

CUF will invest €45 million in a hospital in Braga, which will be ready in 2027 and will create more than 300 jobs. According to the CUF executive committee, the new hospital, which will be located in the space next to the Braga Parque shopping centre, will have 12,000 square metres and will have three operating theatres and 40 inpatient beds. It will also have an Oncology Day Hospital, Intermediate Care Unit, Permanent Care, Imaging "with state-ofthe-art medical equipment" and a "comprehensive range of medical-surgical and technical specialties". "This hospital unit will be linked to the CUF network of hospitals and clinics, in order to ensure a comprehensive, integrated and adapted response to all the health needs of the population, with the capacity to serve more than 100,000 people per year", according to a statement from CUF. It adds that, with the aim of promoting medical training and research,

and thus contributing to the clinical excellence of the hospital, CUF and the University of Minho signed a memorandum of understanding today that foresees the promotion of doctoral programmes for doctors from Minho and cooperation in the area of medical education and clinical research, through the School of Medicine of that academy. CUF emphasises that the new hospital represents its return to the Minho region, five years after the end of the public-private partnership with Hospital de Braga. "We are back with the same approach that we used for 10 years at Hospital de Braga: with a distinctive project and clinical quality, with strong integration into the community and close collaboration with the university", said the president of the CUF Executive Committee. For Rui Diniz, the new

hospital in Braga represents an "important" step in the expansion and consolidation strategy of the CUF network.

Exclusion of Huawei could cost Portugal €1 billion



Huawei's exclusion from 5G networks in Portugal could cost the Portuguese economy more than €1 billion, according to a study carried out by the consultancy firm EY at the request of the Chinese technology company.





ccording to EY's analysis, Huawei's exclusion from 5G networks in Portugal could cost €1.052 billion, including "€339 million in replacement

investments and €193 million in future investments", which could lead to "an estimated 7 percent increase in average tariffs".

To account for the impact of €1.052 billion, the

consultancy also considers €282 million associated with productivity losses, warning in this context of delays in the "full implementation of the 5G network in the country", which could prevent "citizens and companies from taking full advantage of the advantages of the technology". It also takes into account €156 million in depreciation, €58 million in opportunity costs, and €24 million in energy consumption, according to the study.

In September last year, Huawei Portugal filed an administrative action against the Security Assessment Commission (CAS)'s decision on 5G equipment, with the aim of safeguarding its legal rights.

CAS, within the scope of the Cyberspace Security Higher Council, had warned about the security of 5G networks and services when using equipment from suppliers that, among other criteria, are from outside the EU, NATO

or OECD and that "the legal system of the country in which it is domiciled" or connected "allows the Government to exercise control, interference or pressure over its activities operating in third countries". The decision does not mention the names of companies or countries, but the fact is that the Huawei case comes to mind, particularly because the Chinese technology company was banned from 5G networks in other European countries.

In this study, the consultancy also refers to the impact of Huawei Portugal on the Portuguese economy, stating that it "contributes €718 million per year to the national economy, of which €197 million corresponds to Gross

Value Added (GVA)". "The multiplier effect of the Huawei ecosystem is 2x [twice] in national production", the statement indicates.

In terms of employment, according to the study, "the multiplier effect is more significant, reaching 7x", supporting 651 direct jobs and more than four thousand indirect jobs.

"The conclusions of the technical and factual study that we developed show that the economic impact of the operational activities of the Huawei Portugal ecosystem corresponds to approximately 0.3 percent of the national GDP", highlights Hermano Rodrigues, principal at EY-Parthenon and coordinator of the study, quoted in the same



Business Aim to raise minimum wage to €860

The income agreement foresees a minimum wage of €855 euros in 2025, but the Government believes that there are conditions in place for an increase of around 4.9 percent, to €860.





ccording to a report by ECO, the Government will propose an increase in the Guaranteed Minimum Monthly Wage (RMMG) to €860 next year. The increase in the

minimum wage of around 4.9 percent - above the Government's forecast for nominal economic growth, around 4.5 percent - will be discussed with the employers' confederations and trade unions.

The income agreement signed by António Costa's government with the employers' confederations and the UGT in 2022 provided that the minimum wage to be applied in 2025 would be €855. However,

the current government believes that there is room to go further, and is therefore proposing an increase of €40 (from the current €820 to €860), instead of the already agreed increase of €35. For now, among the workers' representatives, the CGTP has already made it clear that it demands that the minimum wage reach €1,000 next year, to cope with the "sharp increase in the cost of living", while the UGT indicated that there is room to reach €890, in an interview with Jornal de Negócios and Antena 1. The promise of a minimum wage of one thousand euros was made by Luís Montenegro during the election campaign and would later be included in the Government's own programme, as one of the

measures aimed at creating a country that "values work". It also follows on from the successive increases that have been made in recent years. After being frozen for several years, the Guaranteed Minimum Monthly Wage rose to €505 in October 2015 and, since then, it has not stopped growing (not even during the years of the pandemic).

Growth

For example, in 2020, it went from €600 to €635. In 2021. from €635 to €705. And in 2022, from €705 to €760. As for 2023, an increase €50 to €810 was planned, but António Costa's government decided to go further and introduced the "largest ever increase in the minimum wage": of €60 to the current €820, that is, an increase

of 7.9 percent. It should be noted, however, that workers who receive the minimum wage have to pay 11 percent of the Single Social Tax (TSU), that is, in 2024, this corresponds to a net salary of €729.80 per month. Despite these successive increases, a recent analysis by the European Foundation for the Improvement of Living and Working Conditions showed that those who receive the guaranteed minimum wage continue to have serious difficulties in paying the bills at the end of the month. Almost three in ten of these Portuguese people admit that it is challenging to balance the family budget, a situation that has been worsened by the high inflation of recent

Minimum wage has one of lowest purchasing powers

Differences between minimum wages are smaller when adjusted for the price levels of the countries, says Eurostat.

The minimum wage in Portugal has been rising in recent years, having been set at €820 in 2024. However, it remains in the middle of the table of minimum wages in the European Union (EU) countries, having even been overtaken by Poland this year. And, Portugal is at the bottom of the EU when it comes to purchasing power parity between those who receive the national minimum wage.

The adjustment of the various minimum wages of the EU countries to the differences in consumer prices in each Member State results in purchasing power parities (PPP). "The disparities in minimum wages are considerably smaller after adjusting for differences in price levels", concludes Eurostat in a statistical

Among the EU countries with a national minimum wage, only Bulgaria, Latvia, Estonia, Slovakia, the Czech Republic, Hungary and Malta have a lower purchasing power parity than Portugal.

Portugal is the 8th EU country with the lowest purchasing power parity, despite being in the group of minimum wages between PPP €1,000 and €1,250, which also includes Cyprus, Croatia, Greece, Lithuania and Romania.

With the highest purchasing power parities for workers (above €1,250) are Luxembourg, Germany, the Netherlands, Belgium, France, Ireland, Poland and

Considering the countries with a minimum wage in the EU, in July, the highest was recorded in Luxembourg (€2,571), being 5.4 times higher than the lowest recorded in Bulgaria (€477). But when compared in terms of purchasing power parity, Luxembourg's minimum wage is only 2.4 times higher than Bulgaria's, Eurostat finds.

Algarve farmers eying up dragon fruit



Dragon fruit is increasingly attracting the attention of Algarve farmers, who are always looking for products that are economically viable and with growing consumer demand.



Dragon fruit is a plant from the cactus family. It is a plant that saves water, that knows how to save water well, which is important in the Algarve,

and that has existed in the Algarve and in Portugal for many years, but it is a recent crop for fruit production", said Amílcar Duarte, a professor at the University of

Algarve, to Lusa agency.
This fruit is native to regions of Central America and Mexico, but in recent years it has been increasingly cultivated in other

continents, with particular importance in countries such as İsrael, Brazil, and China. Amílcar Duarte, who is also a researcher at the Mediterranean Institute for Agriculture, Environment and Development (MED), is leading a project funded by the European Union that has set up an experimental field to study the fruit on the outskirts of Vila Nova de Cacela, in the municipality of Vila Real de Santo António. "The conclusions we reached within the scope of the project were that it is a viable crop [in the Algarve], it is viable both in greenhouses and outdoors [...] as long as there is no frost", explained the professor. The production of the experimental field, with

around 800 plants, set up in

2019, is already sold at the weekly producers' market in Olhão and has managed to face the competition from dragon fruit imported from large international producers. "It is a fruit that is sweet, it is pleasant. And it is a fruit that is very good for your health. It is a nutraceutical, [...], a nutritious food and, therefore, it is of interest for that reason. It fetches high prices and, therefore, it is viable to produce it in the Algarve, selling at these high prices", stated Amílcar Duarte.

Pitaya is a fruit typical of tropical and subtropical areas and is part of the cactus family, and is harvested in the summer and early autumn. Its external appearance leads to it also being known as the "dragon fruit", with its fleshy interior, consisting of black seeds, which can be white or red in colour. Its flavour is sweet and refreshing, and some people compare it to that of watermelon.

Amílcar Duarte highlighted the importance of this plant for the many small farms in the Algarve, providing small farmers with a high yield per

"This crop has aroused great interest, because it is an exotic fruit, with a different appearance from what we are used to and a plant that saves water", said the university professor.

Amílcar Duarte stressed that interest in buying dragon fruit has increased among consumers and also among producers, who are seeking to "diversify" their production.


When to worry about forgetfulness

Lisbon among most profitable capitals

Lisbon is the 6th European capital where it is most profitable to buy a house to put on the rental market.





ooking at 32 European countries, Global Property Guide concludes that Lisbon is the 6th European capital where it is most profitable to invest in a house to put on the rental market. According to the calculations of the international real estate consultancy, the gross profitability of housing rentals in Lisbon stood at 5.65 percent at the end of June this year.

There are five European capitals where it is more profitable to rent a house than in Lisbon. In first place is Dublin (Ireland), with an average gross profitability of 7.33 percent, followed by Rome (6.82 percent), Riga (6.46 percent), Bucharest (6.3 percent) and Podgorica (5.7 percent).

The European capitals where it

is least profitable to buy a house to rent are Oslo, in Norway (2.46 percent) and Luxembourg (2.58 percent), according to the same data. In addition to the European capitals, the real estate consultancy also analysed the average profitability of other Portuguese cities. And it concluded that in Setúbal, investing in a house to rent has an average profitability of 6.51 percent, higher than that of Lisbon. Porto, Faro, Aveiro and Braga had average profitability above 5 percent, but below that of the Portuguese capital, writes Público. It should also be noted that the profitability rate calculated takes into account the tax burden of each country. In Portugal, income from housing has been subject to an autonomous rate of 25 percent

(previously it was 28 percent) for short-term rental contracts since last October, with the entry into force of the Mais Habitação programme. And this rate can be reduced further if the rental contract is for a period of more than 3 years. The comparison of the tax burden on housing rentals between European countries is not straightforward, as some markets have a single rate and others have progressive rates. However, according to the same newspaper, it is possible to see from the data that Portugal is in the middle of the table with regard to the tax burden on property income, in line with other countries. And, therefore, the rental values charged in our country make it possible to offset the tax burden.

Algarve affordable for millionaires

The Algarve is the most affordable prime market in Europe for millionaires, followed by Bordeaux and Tuscany.



However, according to Knight Frank's European Lifestyle Report, it was one of the regions whose residential property prices increased the most in percentage terms after the pandemic. Conversely, London is the most expensive destination, even for millionaires.

"Europe is at the top of the world rankings in terms of countries with the greatest diversity of property owners in terms of nationality, with Portugal in seventh place out of 10 destinations", states the press release from the real estate agency, a partner in Portugal of Quintela + Penalva since 2022.

France comes in first place, followed by Spain (in 2nd), Italy, the United Kingdom, Greece and Switzerland (respectively). Croatia is in 8th, Ireland in 9th and Germany in 10th place.

"Portugal is among the countries that offer the most tax benefits to new residents, whether on passive income and capital gains, or on pensions and/or income from work, along with countries such as France, Austria and Spain", it reads.

For Kate Everett-Allen, Head of Europe Residential Research at Knight Frank, "changes in market conditions, tax incentives, visa options and lifestyle improvements can also influence the decisions of the wealthiest to move to another country".

"The pandemic, new hybrid work models and the increase in early retirement or semi-retirement among people in their fifties have contributed to this trend of increased mobility", she highlights.

The international study also reveals that millionaires prioritise security and privacy "over tax benefits when it comes to moving or buying a second home, due to geopolitical concerns".

Paris, Berlin, Barcelona, Vienna and Madrid are among the European cities most desired by the wealthiest who are thinking of moving to Western Europe. Lisbon is in the top 5 choices of cities to live in for its quality of life, and is chosen in fourth place for environmental quality.

Discover a refreshed and revived Sharm-el-Sheikh

The Red Sea resort has bounced back as a reliable winter sun destination.

azzled by the neon lights and heaving bazaars of Naama Bay, it's hard to imagine this patch on land on the southern tip of Egypt's Sinai Peninsula was once a small fishing village. Over the decades, sleepy beach fronts have been transformed with allinclusive resorts and dive schools, making Sharmel-Sheikh a top winter sun destination.

But the last few years haven't been easy. Over tourism and poor behaviour threatened to destroy the fragile coral reefs which have made this Red Sea outpost a top diving destination. Security concerns have also been raised. In 2015, a Russian plane was bombed shortly after take-off from the airport, causing a rapid decline in tourist numbers. Rumblings in the Middle East and the war in Gaza have also resulted in a loss of confidence in the region.

Not high risk

But according to the FCDO (Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office), the Gulf of Aqaba coastal region, at the northern

tip of the Red Sea, is not deemed high-risk. In fact, despite a few shaky years, Sharm is bouncing back. New environmental regulations have improved the underwater experience for divers and snorkellers (not to mention the wildlife), and new investment has allowed resorts to up their game. One of those properties is the Iberotel Redsina in Nabq Bay, which reopened with a new name following a transformation earlier this year. Surrounded by golden sands and gardens of lofty palms and bulbous cacti nurtured for 20 years, the 521-room property has a dive centre, spa and multiple restaurants. Competitive prices, a mid-haul flight time of five hours, no jet lag (GMT+3), and balmy temperatures (24C in December) make it a very appealing winter sun destination. Here are three more reasons to go to Sharm...

Idyllic beaches

The sun shines (almost) every day of the year, making it possible to enjoy a good selection of beaches Lined with cafes and restaurants, crescentshaped Naama Bay is the

area's glittering tourist hub. The calm, clear waters make it perfect for swimming, snorkelling and watersports, while the bars play music into the night.

The more secluded shores of Sharks Bay appeal to those seeking peace and relaxation, while Terrazzina Beach has a laid-back, bohemian feel which sets it apart from more commercial resort areas. The shallow waters and soft sands are ideal for families. For divers, Ras Um Sid is a favourite. Famous for its lighthouse and cliffside views, it provides easy access to coral gardens and a gorgonian forest teeming with marine biodiversity.

Exceptional diving

An underwater wonderland of coral reefs, the Red Sea is regarded as one of the world's top diving destinations. Ras Mohammed National Park, a short boat ride away, is decorated with vibrant reefs and dramatic drop-offs. Brightly coloured fish dart through coral gardens, while larger residents like manta rays and reef sharks can be found in the depths. For those who prefer to stay closer to the surface, snorkelling in clear waters

is equally impressive. There's also the option to try an assisted 'Discovery Dive', where instructors will help you descend in scuba gear for a taste of what it's like to explore underwater. All round, the experience has improved. The Egyptian government has established protected marine areas and implemented regulations that limit boat access to certain fragile sites. Boats are now required to anchor at designated mooring points to prevent damage to coral reefs, and there are fines for littering and other harmful activities.

A rich history

While Sharm El Sheikh's coastal charms are hard to resist, the desert landscapes of the Sinai Peninsula are equally captivating. Find silence and solitude in the wind-sculpted mountains, which feel as if they haven't changed for centuries. At the foot of Mount Sinai, where Moses is said to have received the Ten Commandments, lies St. Catherine's Monastery founded in the 6th century, it's one of the oldest Christian monasteries in the world.

Many pilgrims visit the

UNESCO World Heritage site to study the Byzantine architecture, admire sacred relics and make a wish at the burning bush where Moses spoke to God, according to the Book of Exodus. One of the most magical ways to visit is with a sunrise hike along the 6.5 mile Mount Sinai trail. Tour companies collect guests from their resorts in Sharm to begin the hike at 1am, stopping at makeshift Bedouin tea stops along the way. Watching the sun blink above a horizon of endless peaks is soul-stirring.

Stretching your summer



With the high cost of gas and the airlines cancelling flights right and left, I've come to the realization I won't be taking a vacation this year. I even told my luggage that, as I sadly put them in storage. Now I'm dealing with a lot of emotional baggage.





can't take credit for that unattributed comment I found online, but I can certainly relate to it. Having said that, it seems that plenty of people were -and are even now - away on férias. It's been a challenge these past weeks to have our car repaired, get a doctor appointment, or arrange to see an advertised rental property. If you haven't yet indulged in your own getaway, or if you have and would like another shot at the season, you might like this article, "Beach Accommodation for the Last Summer Dip" that I came across, recommending places in Spain. If you prefer to remain in Portugal, naturally there are endless options right here at home. Here are some suggestions.

There are no bars or restaurants (although there's a kiosk selling cold beer), but a visit to Praia de Paço is well worth your time. Located an hour north of Porto, this intimate beach is a half-mile stretch of sandy coves with shallow

inlets that are perfect for children. Free parking and restrooms are available. Explore the nearby 18th century fort when you tire of sand and sea, and when you've worked up an appetite, head 15 minutes south to the city of Viana do Castelo.

Central Region

There's an extensive network of praias fluviais, river beaches, in the center of Portugal. There you'll find calmer, cleaner, warmer waters, on grassy and sandy banks, often with outdoor cafés shaded by brightly colored umbrellas. One excellent choice is Praia de Palheiros do Zorro, which translates to Beach of the Fox's Haystacks. It also translates to a welcoming river beach near the bustling university town of Coimbra. Leave your car in the parking lot and head to the bar for a drink and snack and then take a dip in water so shallow it gives the impression of a large pool. Stretch out on the ample sandy expanse or under a shaded tree. The recreation area also offers a volleyball court on site. My favorite (so far) is the

zona balnear or "bathing zone" of Meimão, not to be confused with Meimoa, although that river beach is lovely, and ranked number 1 of 11 things to do in Penamacor.

Sertã is an interesting river beach in the Castelo Branco district in that it runs through town, so when you're done with swimming, there are shops and restaurants right nearby.

Lisbon Coast

Near the city of Setúbal, Serra de Arrábida Natural Park is considered a Portuguese paradise. It's home to rare animal species, fascinating caves and a 16th century abbey. But the sparkling jewel is the stretch of the area's magnificent beaches, Portinho de Arrábida. There are actually four principal beaches here, with crystal clear, turquoise waters: Praia da Figuerinha, Praia do Creiro, Praia da Galápos, and Praia de Galapinhos.

The first two are the most easily accessible, with several parking lots available to visitors. Or you can take a bus from the Alegro Shopping Center in Setúbal directly to the

beaches. If you don't want to go all the way back to Setúbal to dine, grab a burger, fries, and cold drink at O Zeca beach bar and restaurant on Estrada do Portinho do Arrábida.

Alentejo

Vicentine Coast Natural Park, termed the last wild coast in Europe, has a hidden gem in Praia da Amália, near the village of Azenho do Mar in Odemira. This small beach - it virtually disappears at high tide -was named for the legendary fadista Amália Rodrigues, who both learned to swim and kept a vacation home here. Access requires a fair hike down to the water, so it's really not for children. But if you are looking for unspoiled and private, this

Algarve

Meia Praia is the largest beach in Lagos, and many say it's the best in the Western Algarve, where sandstone cliffs give way to grassy banks bordering languorous stretches of golden sand. There's a lot to support that designation, because of the

beach's bars, restaurants, and marina. But if you're looking for stunning scenery, my suggestion is Praia de Benagil in Lagoa. Carved over millennia by rainwater and the crashing Atlantic surf, the coastal



Who were the Moors...



...And what were they doing in Portugal?





ou are probably aware that Portugal has a Moorish influence. The word 'Moor', comes from the Latin 'Maurus', first used by the Romans to denote someone from the Roman province of Mauretania, which was made up of the western part of present-day Algeria and the north-eastern part of what is now Morocco. It doesn't refer to a particular ethnicity, but rather to a mix of North African and Arabian Muslims who colonised Spain during the 8th century. The region that would become Spain was called Iberia, and research has suggested that by the 10th century, half the population of the Iberian Peninsula was Muslim.

Invaded and Conquered

The Moorish Invasion of Portugal took place in the year 711 when a Muslim army led by Tariq ibn Ziyad crossed the Strait of Gibraltar, and for centuries the Moors

ruled over Portugal, leaving an enduring mark on the country's landscape. Their presence lasted for over four centuries, revolutionising Portugal's agriculture, along with intellectual and artistic achievements. They introduced new crops such as rice, citrus fruits, pomegranate and even sugarcane. They established themselves in various areas, including Lisbon (which they called 'Lashbuna'), Santarém, and Mértola. The Moors may have started as conquerors, but soon became skilled architects, scientists, and musicians.

What they gave us They gave us irrigation systems, and, of course, the splendid 'azulejo's (ceramic tiles) that are everywhere here, both inside and out. Their architecture of intricate geometric patterns and ornate decorations, flat roofs (did you know these are actually better at keeping out the heat?), and the famous 'Hand of Fatima' door knocker, can still be

seen in Portugal today.

Notable Moorish Sites in Portugal

There are several significant Moorish towns still scattered across Portugal, and these are a few of a pretty long list. The Castle of the Moors (Castelo dos Mouro) in Sintra, is one of the most iconic Moorish sites in Portugal, and the Castle of Silves (Castelo de Silves) is a classic example of Moorish presence in the Algarve region and is a magnificent Moorish fortification. Although São Jorge Castle (Castelo de São Jorge) in Lisbon has undergone several modifications over the years, the origins of this castle date back to the Moors. Even Albufeira's Old Town – nowadays a hotspot for tourists - is a region in the Algarve that has a distinct Moorish character, with narrow winding streets and whitewashed houses. In Mértola in the Alentejo region, there is a well-preserved Moorish mosque, that was converted into a church. Significant is Évora, a

site, that has a rich history dating back to the Moors, including the city walls and architectural details in the old town

The Decline of the **Moors**

The Moors' presence in Portugal gradually declined. The 'Reconquista' was a series of Christian military campaigns aimed at reclaiming the Iberian Peninsula from Muslim rule, and in 1139, after a victorious battle, Afonso declared himself King Afonso I of Portugal, and thus began the slow process of driving the Moors out of Portugal. Although battles were fought by Christian rulers against Muslim ones, it didn't mean an end to the Muslim presence in Portugal.

Vasco da Gama was celebrated as a national hero for opening the sea route to India that gave Portugal access to the spice trade, which had been controlled by the Arabs until then, and apparently was also campaign of terror against Muslims in the struggle for control of the sea trade. In retaliation for attacks against the Portuguese, he is said to have captured a ship with 200 Muslim pilgrims on board returning from Mecca and set it alight, killing many.

Arab Influence in the Portuguese Language

Among the words that the Arabs bequeathed are a good few place-

'AL,' which meant 'the west', and others are those beginning with AZ or AS, (corresponding to the Arabic definite article) or OD, (meaning river). So when you find yourself wandering the streets of Portugal's towns, remember the Moors and their impact on the beauty, culture, and history of Portugal, even food -Cataplana is a popular dish we have inherited from them.

oth women told The Portugal News that they want to improve the space by creating the Love Affair Basement (L.A.B), to spread love, and create a space where everybody can feel secure, happy and, above all, loved. Dina and Olga are also asking for people to help them raise the money to finish the work for a project that will bring a new life to Hackney Road in London

The Portugal News (TPN): When and how did you decide to create A Portuguese Love Affair? Olga Cruchinho (OC):

Portuguese Love Affair was created 11 years ago, under various circumstances. We had a business in Portugal, then we came to London aiming to work for ourselves, in this case. Then, we raised money and wanted to go back to Portugal, but London ended up 'swallowing' us a little bit and we decided to open a business in London. It started with a little store on Columbia Road, then there was an expansion and now we are in the third phase of the business, which is a more playful and fun part.

TPN: Do you want to explain further about this new phase? Dina Martins (DN):

The new project is also something that we've been thinking about for some time, but sometimes you don't have the energy. And the world is kind of confusing, making it feel like it's more difficult to believe that things can happen.

Despite that, we realised that we had a fantastic group of people around us. From artists to lawyers, to people who do workshops, to people with some skills. Many queer people! And with many places, especially here in East London, which made us think that it was maybe a good opportunity now. Since we had a group of people.

In other words, our idea is to have the space to have two moments. During the day, we're thinking about a place for workshops or conferences, and maybe some company lunches. And then, at night our idea is to have a very diversified programme. Trying to support as many people as possible.

The main idea is to bring, for example, a movie night, a theatre night, stand-up

comedy, live music and even some cabaret nights. All aiming to create a community place of sharing, knowledge, while supporting people. For example, we found therapists who agreed to do group therapy sessions for transexual kids, for example, promoting inclusion and safety for minorities who need a little more support.

TPN: By creating a space where it can be safer for these people to be, does it mean that there is not so much security for these minorities to express themselves freely in that

OC: Yes, but in the world in general. We are in a moment in which we were a little better than we are now. In the world in general, just look at the case of the United States, even here in England and Portugal as well. A setback one definitely felt around the globe, and no one can deny it.

Here, it is still a very open area, but the truth is that many venues aimed at queers have been closing. And some other sites that we know of are no longer as inclusive, as we would

like to think they should be. And we have noticed that. **DN:** In this place, we will try to include as many people as possible. Not only queer people, but also for disabled people, for example. One of the things we want to do is to create a distance list, from the nearest bus stop, giving people more accessibility information.

TPN: What are the expectations for this new project?

DN: The feedback has been very positive, and people seem very excited about the project. People want to do things, and several people have already come forward. And I think we are confident, as it is a new project however it is part of an 11-year-old business.

TPN: What about the $crowd funding\ you\ created?$ Is there something you would like to share with the TPN readers?

OC: People can simply make a donation. But there is also a way that may appeal to more people. We only ask people, for those who do not want to donate to buy things, just for us to have the money to be able to assemble everything.

Most of the people want to have their name on the wall. They know us and like us and want to be part of the project. So, they ask to include their name on the wall, just like sponsors. That has been what has been sold the most. Even though it is not the cheapest purchase people may contribute at A Portuguese Love Affair. **DN:** What we are trying to say is that the person who only buys a beer is already helping us as we need that money now to be able to pay for the works. We are now spending money on

works without making any money, at the moment. The works are aimed to be finished in two or three weeks, and the crowdfunding will be open until 13 September, with the possibility of being extended for more time. At this point, Olga and Dina need, as seen on their crowdfunding, £60,000 to pay for everything they need to do.








New books to read this week

acqueline Wilson returns with her first adult's novel since the 1970s...

1. Think Again by Jacqueline Wilson is published in hardback by Bantam A comforting, engaging, nostalgic, and heartwarming read – the iconic Jacqueline Wilson is back with her latest adult novel called Think Again, a sequel to the Girls franchise. Following Ellie Allard's life into adulthood, the novel starts on her 40th birthday, where she finds life is not looking exactly how she had imagined – but there is so much for her to learn and discover, she just doesn't know it yet. Themes of motherhood, friendships, relationships, school, sex, body image, health, and employment are covered in the most relatable way, making you smile and laugh and ask questions to yourself along the way. You never feel alone reading one of Wilson's books and her writing is brilliant and honest. This is a mustread for any Jacqueline Wilson fan – you won't be disappointed.

2. What A Way To Go by Bella Mackie is published in hardback by The Borough Press

After the roaring success of her debut, How To Kill Your Family – soon to become a Netflix series starring Anya Taylor-Joy -Bella Mackie is back with another murder mystery. What A Way To Go begins with the suspicious death of ultra-wealthy Anthony Wistern, a businessman who gets gruesomely impaled at his 60th birthday party. The book is subsequently told from multiple perspectives - from Anthony, looking at proceedings from a kind of purgatory; his odious family members, scrabbling for the inheritance and discovering that their father was no angel; and an amateur sleuth, who's convinced the death is foul play. Mackie's latest offering is fast-paced, funny and will have you guessing until the end – it will no doubt be another bestseller.

3. Blackwater by Michael McDowell is published in paperback by Penguin Originally published in 1983, Blackwater I: The Flood is the first in the six-book Blackwater series set in the small community of Perdido, Alabama in the early 20th century. It begins with a catastrophic flood that brings destruction - and something more sinister to the town. As the waters recede, the focus turns to the efforts of the respectable yet dysfunctional Caskey family, to come to terms with the mysterious newcomer in their midst. While the dialogue is at times somewhat leaden, the horror-inflected southern

setting drips with enough atmosphere and charm to keep you engaged.


4. Rosen's Almanac by Michael Rosen is published in hardback by Ebury Press



significant opposition and numerous


challenges, his dedication to the

What do we know about batteries?

Nothing is worse than a dead one!





hy were they even called batteries I wondered, and discovered that from the mid-18th century experimenters used 'Leyden jars' to store electrical charge, but their stored charge would be released all at once. Experimenters took to hooking several Leyden jars together to create a stronger charge, and one of them called his grouping an 'electrical battery', a play on the military term

Batteries are said to have been originally invented by Alessandro Volta in 1800, who stacked discs of copper and zinc separated by cloth soaked in salt water, and the 'volt' - a way to measure the strength of an electric current - was named in his honour in 1881. In 1780 Luigi Galvani gruesomely announced that he had made the leg muscles of a skinned frog twitch by using contact with two different metals, and Volta began exploring various



metals - experimenting on his own tongue!

Ancient Battery

Apparently, way back before Volta's time, between 250 BCE to CE 250, came the 'Baghdad Battery', a clay jar with a stopper made of asphalt, and poking through the asphalt was an iron rod surrounded by a copper cylinder. When filled with vinegar – or any other electrolytic solution - the jar produced around 1.1 volts. There is no record as to the precise function of the jar, but best guess is that it was a primitive type of battery, maybe used for electroplating, although no records exist to suggest electroplating was around then. Sadly, due to military conflicts, Iraq has lost many of its rare archaeological treasures, including this artefact, which to this day remains a phenomenon for which scientists have found no satisfactory explanation. An engineer of the GE Company in the US tested a model of the Baghdad Battery recreated from an illustration, and using copper sulphate was able to generate electricity of 0.5 volts. In 1970, a similar experiment was conducted by a scientist using fresh grape juice instead of vinegar, and managed to generate 0.87 volts – said to be enough electrical power to electroplate a silver statue with gold.

Several suggestions have been made in an effort to solve the mystery of the Baghdad Battery, and one of them was that it was something to do with acupuncture, as needles were found discovered close by. Another idea suggested that it was made specially for the practice of ritual magic, and that priests may have hidden the 'battery' inside their idols and statues of the Gods, creating warmth within the object to convince people

of their magical strength. **Lead Acid Batteries**

In 1859, came the first rechargeables - lead acid batteries - which subsequently provided enough charge to start a car. Since the electrolyte is a corrosive acid, the external casing had to be tough to protect against harm, and lead-acid batteries are still chunky and heavy today.

Modern Alkaline Batteries

In 1924, a group of people mainly from the battery industry, made a standard system of battery sizes, using the letters of the alphabet - and 'A, 'B,' 'C, 'D,''E,'etc. were used. Over time, some of the types of batteries simply died out (no pun intended), because they were no longer used in any products, although some may still be made for a very limited range of products.

The cell sizes today are AAAA, AAA, AA, C and D, with various other button or coin-shaped batteries now available for anything from hearing aids to weighing

Lithium Batteries

A controversial hot topic! The extraction and production processes for lithium are said to be worse for the climate than fossil fuels, but the lithium-ion battery has transformed technology, from smartphones to

electric vehicles. Apart from environment concerns, the main issue with them is a phenomenon known as 'thermal runaway' - the chemical reaction to make them work can create excessive heat, causing fires in extreme cases.

Graphene could be the next big thing in the battery world, with some prototypes apparently charging 60 times faster and holding a charge up to 5 times longer without the safety issues of lithium-ion batteries.





The new Hyundai Santa Fe

Available with seven seats as standard and efficient hybrid powertrains, is Hyundai's flagship SUV the one to beat? Cameron Richards finds out.



What is it?

The Santa Fe has become one of the most recognisable models in Hyundai's range. It was the first premium SUV for the brand and in the last two decades, it has improved its driving dynamics, equipment levels and drivetrains. But, does this latest fifth-generation car set a new benchmark? Let's find out.

What's new?

This new Santa Fe not only debuts a wild and wacky exterior but has also been given some healthy increases in space to help deliver more interior room than before. Its cabin materials have improved and there is the option of a six-seater variant to help out when you've got

more people to take along for the ride. Also, while a lot of car

manufacturers are pushing for EVs in this sector of the market, Hyundai has decided to go the other direction and offer this big family bus with either plugin or hybrid powertrains

What's under the bonnet?

There's a choice of two engines, a standard hybrid or a plug-in hybrid. We are driving the former which comes fitted with a 1.6-litre turbocharged four-cylinder petrol engine mated to an electric motor that produces 158bhp, 265Nm of torque and can enable 0-60mph in 9.5 seconds.

The latter is fitted with the same engine, but there is an added benefit of a 13.8kWh battery pack which boosts power up to 250bhp and reduces the Santa Fe's 0-60mph time to 9.1 seconds. It also can do a claimed 33.6 miles on electric power alone which should help reduce emissions and fuel costs even further.

What's it like to drive?

Make no mistake, the Santa Fe is a big car, but to drive, it's all surprisingly intuitive. Around the bends, it handles really well with sufficient amounts of grip and a decent level of steering feel - there is also not as much body roll as you'd think for such a tall and boxy vehicle, either. The ride is smooth,

with the car only being shaken by the biggest of bumps, but overall, the ride and handling are impressive. There is plenty of visibility, thanks to a lot of glass area and the view out the back is aided even further on our top-spec model as it's fitted with a rear-view mirror that can be switched to a camera. The only downsides to its driving experience are the petrol engine sounds a little strangled under hard acceleration and the steering wheel itself is fairly large which doesn't feel natural to the touch.

How does it look?

The styling of the Santa Fe is bold, to say the least with lots of angular and flat design cues. The front end features a honeycombstyle front grille as well as 'H' shaped front headlights that integrate LED daytime running lights.

What's it like inside?

The cabin has an upmarket feel, with a lot of high-end materials used throughout and our test car even has Alcantara A, B and C pillar panels. The dashboard itself features two 12.3-inch screens for the infotainment and instrument cluster which make the design look decluttered and modern with confusing form over function. Storage is plentiful with a large cut-out in the centre console, big enough to fit an umbrella in. There are large door pockets and you'll find an additional storage area under the front armrest, too. The glovebox is of average size, but there is an added benefit of a longer and narrower compartment that sits above and fits flush in the dashboard.

Interior space is impressive with loads of room in the second row, with tonnes of head, knee and legroom as well as a completely flat floor. In the third row, although space will be acceptable for short journeys, the high floor means that taller passengers will find their knees are almost around their elbows - however they do get their own air-conditioning controls, USB-C ports and 12v sockets.

What's the spec like?

The Santa Fe spec levels are generous no matter what version you go for. There are three trim levels to choose from including Premium, Ultimate and Calligraphy. The Premium and features a 12.3-inch touchscreen, heated front seats and an electric tailgate. All plug-in hybrid models come with four-wheel-drive as standard, while hybrid cars have the choice of a two-wheel-drive option as

Verdict

Hyundai has taken a risk with the new Santa Fe and it has certainly paid off. Its looks will not be to everyone's liking but, scratch behind its marmite exterior and what lies beneath is a car that is excellent to drive, has a very well-thoughtout cabin and is incredibly versatile and flexible in its seating arrangements. Added to that is an efficient array of hybrid powertrains and you've got a car that will suit your family's needs without breaking the bank to run. The new Santa Fe is a tough act to follow and other car manufacturers should be worried as Hyundai has just upped the game even further.

This is the ideal time to check the health and wellbeing of our four-legged best friends, which is especially the case for dogs who, due to their outdoor activities, may show greater signs of wear and tear. In this context, experts from Kivet, Kiwoko's network of veterinary clinics, and Mundo Belleza, the grooming centres of the same brand, offer some advice on what

Grooming

"It's crucial to check your dog's fur for knots, dirt and possible parasites after a holiday," says Kiwoko's grooming expert. "Regular brushing helps keep the fur clean and tangle-free. It's also important to use dog-specific shampoos that won't irritate the skin, especially if they've been to the beach, to remove any salt residue."

Skin health

"Applying moisturising products to the skin is essential to prevent dryness and possible irritation caused by the sun and salt water," explains Raquel Muro, Veterinarian at Kivet. "It's also essential to inspect the skin for redness, lumps or sores and consult your vet if you find any abnormalities."

Taking care of the paws


The pads, one of the animal's most delicate areas, can be damaged by exposure to hot asphalt and sand," stresses the veterinary expert. "It is advisable to apply specific moisturising creams to prevent cracks and burns and to regularly check for cuts, thorns or small stones embedded in the paws".

Clean ears

"It is essential to clean the ears with specific products to avoid infections and prevent the development of inflammation, especially if the dog has taken the opportunity to swim during the holidays", says the grooming specialist. "Observing signs such as redness, intense odour or secretion may indicate a pathology, which should be examined by the veterinarian as soon as possible".

Proper hydration and balanced nutrition


"After intense physical activity, it is essential to ensure that the dog always has access to fresh water to avoid dehydration", stresses Raquel Muro. "In addition, it is important to adjust the diet, if there have



Parasite prevention

"After going out to the countryside or the beach, rigorous control of your dog's parasites and the use of deworming products are essential," emphasise both professionals. "It is also important to keep your dog's internal and external

deworming schedule up to




"Maintaining a consistent daily routine helps your dog adapt to the home after the holidays. Providing toys and games to keep your pet mentally stimulated reduces stress," explains the veterinarian.

"It is crucial to be aware of any changes in your dog's behaviour that may indicate discomfort or health problems. Do not hesitate to consult your

veterinarian if you notice significant changes in your pet's behaviour or physical condition."

Veterinary visit

"Finally, scheduling a visit to the veterinarian for a general check-up ensures that your dog is in good health," suggests the Kivet specialist. "Checking that all of its vaccinations are up to date and administering the necessary ones are essential for a dogs well-being, as is consulting your veterinarian if any changes are detected."

Storing pots

There are novelty ways of storing pots, suggests Bex Lund, co-founder of YardArt UK, which produces creative artwork for outdoor spaces.

"Wall-mounted plant holders are typically installed on exterior garden walls or fences but could also be placed on the side of a shed to display and store smaller pots with flowers or herbs, freeing up ground space. "This will both declutter your garden floor and add some nice vertical interest to your outdoor space. These holders come in different styles – from simple metal brackets to more elaborate wooden or ceramic designs, so you can choose something that properly complements

Garden cushion solutions

your garden's aesthetic."

If you have a big garden set and don't want to put your cushions in the loft in winter, a waterproof storage box is probably the only

as invisible as it can be, by placing it around the sides of your house or underneath a window, where it won't immediately be seen. "Dedicated cushion storage bags and boxes are designed with the sole purpose to protect your cushions while not in use, preserving their quality and enhancing your garden's aesthetic by blending functionality with style," says Mairi Devlin, head of outdoor at B&Q. "Some garden furniture sets offer integrated storage compartments, providing convenient and

solution. But make sure it's

secure protection for your cushions that are just as effective as dedicated bags and boxes," she continues. "Before you even begin to find a location for them, you may want to invest in some vacuum-sealed bags," advises Vlatka Lake, storage expert at selfstorage operator Space Station.

"Not only will these protect your furnishings against moisture, dust and pests, but they will also help you save valuable storage space, keeping clutter and bulky

eyesores to a minimum. Once you have done that, find a dry, cool, and dark area, such as a shed, garage, or indoor storage room, and place your sealed items on shelves or pallets off the ground. This helps protect them from any potential water damage or animals."

Garden furniture

Garden furniture has come a long way, with garden benches, seats and tables which are designed to house cushions and other soft furnishings.

More weather-resistant materials are also widely available, but to tidy things up, invest in a good cover that fits your furniture and can easily be secured for the winter. Stackable chairs which can be covered also make a space-saving option.

Hiding toys

Lund says: "For storing garden toys, low-profile wooden benches with hidden compartments work wonders. They not only provide extra seating but also keep things tidy."

"When it comes to stashing away garden toys, one handy solution is a deck box," suggests Lake.

"These durable containers can hold a surprising amount of clutter and are typically made of plastic or resin that makes them waterproof, perfect for hiding items away, whether that's a tricycle or a pair of tennis rackets.

"Their short stature also makes them a great choice for those of you trying to

teach your little ones to tidy up, as children can place them straight back in the box once they've done

Organising the shed

"Typically, garden sheds are amongst the most cluttered spaces in any home, quickly becoming over-crowded with tools, garden appliances, and miscellaneous items.

"To keep clutter off the floor, it's important to consider what storage solutions can be applied to your shed. Installing hooks or magnetic tool holders on the walls of your shed frees up muchneeded floor space," says Devlin.

"Similarly, depending on the size of your shed, you can also utilise free-standing shelving units to help keep the area neat and tidy. Essentially, by maximising vertical space it becomes easier to maintain a tidy shed and make way for floor-based storage bins - another great storage solution that can be used to compartmentalise smaller items."

Store frequently used items like gloves and twine at eye level for easy access, suggests Darren Craven, furniture buyer for British Garden Centres.

For heavier items like fertilisers or lawn seed, opt for floor-level storage, and place seasonal tools on higher shelves. Glass jars are perfect for organising small hardware, seeds or bird food, he adds.

How and when to clean your bedding

From sheets to duvet and pillows, a healthy sleeping environment signals a good night's Zs.

hether your bedroom scheme is calm and contemporary with clean lines or frilly and flouncy, when it comes down to the bare bones, it's all about your bed – and best possible night's slumber.

Moreover, with a switch in season after the warm, sticky nights of summer, open windows with dust and pollen settling on sills, drapes and bedding, a deep clean is a no-brainer.

And with the The Sleep Charity's annual awareness campaign, Sleeptember, reminding us of the benefits of sleep for your health and wellbeing, it's time to give your bed a refresh...

Wash sheets and pillowcases weekly

"Your sheets and pillowcases bear the brunt of nightly wear, collecting sweat, skin cells, and dust," highlights Deyan Dimitrov, laundry expert at Laundryheap.

"Regular cleaning is crucial to keeping them clean and fresh."

"Aim to wash your sheets weekly," adds Dimitrov. "If you sweat heavily or suffer from allergies, consider washing them more frequently.

"In colder months, when you might sweat less and the

sheets take longer to dry, you could extend this to every 10 days to two weeks."

When washing, he says to use a gentle detergent and opt for cool or warm water to prevent fading and damage to the

"Hot water can weaken the fabric over time. Ironing sheets isn't necessary with modern wrinkle-resistant fabrics, but if you prefer the crisp feel of ironed sheets, use a low-heat setting to avoid damaging the fibres," he adds. For an added touch of luxury, Dimitrov suggests adding a few drops of essential oil, such as lavender or eucalyptus, to the rinse cycle.

"This will leave your sheets smelling lovely and promote better sleep."

Wash duvet covers fortnightly

Duvet covers don't require washing as often as sheets, but it's still important to clean them regularly, underlines Dimitrov. "A fortnightly wash is recommended, especially in warmer months when dust and allergens can build up more quickly." He says to wash duvet covers in cool or warm water using a mild detergent, and always check the care label for any specific instructions. "Dry the cover thoroughly

before using it again to prevent mustiness or mildew," warns Dimitrov. "If your duvet cover has delicate detailing or made from a special fabric, make sure to follow the care instructions closely to avoid any damage."

Wash duvet and pillows every three months


Duvets and pillows don't need frequent washing, but a seasonal clean is important to remove dust mites, allergens, and bacteria, notes Dimitrov. And with autumn round the corner, he says it's a good idea to give them a thorough clean at the beginning of each season.

Most synthetic duvets and pillows can be machinewashed on a gentle cycle with warm water and mild detergent, says Dimitrov, and here's a hot tip...

"To prevent the filling from clumping, make sure they're dried thoroughly, adding a few clean tennis balls or dryer balls to the dryer can help keep the filling evenly distributed."

For down or feather duvets, he says it's essential to follow the manufacturer's care instructions, as these materials may require specific washing techniques or professional cleaning.

"If washing at home, use a



"If your duvet or pillows aren't machine-washable, airing them outside on a sunny day is a great alternative," suggests Dimitroy.

"The UV rays naturally disinfect and deodorise, refreshing the items without the need for washing."

Seasonal care and mattress maintenance

Regular maintenance is crucial for a clean and healthy bed...

Aim to vacuum your mattress once a month to remove

dust, dirt, and allergens that accumulate on the surface and in the fabric, advises Dimitrov. "For a deeper clean, sprinkle baking soda over the mattress and let it sit for a few hours before vacuuming it off. "Baking soda neutralises

odours and absorbs moisture that may have seeped into the mattress over time."
For stubborn stains, he says to mix a mild detergent with a little water to spot-clean the


affected areas.
"Be careful not to get the mattress too wet, and allow it to air dry completely before remaking the bed.

Divitrov continues: "Flipping or rotating your mattress

seasonally helps to ensure even wear, which prolongs its lifespan. However, check the manufacturer's recommendations, as not all mattresses are designed to be flipped."

The cleaning expert says by following these guidelines, you'll not only get to enjoy the fresh feeling of clean sheets, but also extend the life of your bedding and mattress. "As you move through the seasons, mark your calendar with reminders for these essential cleaning tasks. Your future self – and your sleep – will thank you," concludes Dimitrov.

Nights Out at Home

The MasterChef judge and long-standing food critic talks about negative reviews and cooking his favourite restaurant dishes at home.



n his 25 years as a revered restaurant critic – and even after his most brutal takedowns – Jay Rayner says he never feels guilty. "I don't, because I don't do it lightly, and I don't think you should ever do it lightly, you should pick your targets very carefully," says the 57-year-old Observer newspaper critic.

"I live by a single rule: punch up, not down. There's no point in kicking 10 tonnes of crap out of a small, family-run restaurant that's failing – they're going to fail all by themselves. His latest offering, Nights Out At Home, brings together the food that Rayner has created at home, each inspired by specific dishes he's tucked into in top restaurants, as well as a few high-street favourites. You'll find a version of McDonald's deep-fried apple pie, Nando's peri peri chicken livers and the "cultural treasure", a Greggs' steak bake.

He doesn't think all critics have to cook but, "I do think you need an appetite. One of the reasons I've been able to do this job for 25 years is because – the polite word is a highly developed appetite – or just pure greed. I like my dinner, and it follows from that, eventually you will start cooking.

Ultimate cheese toastie

Ingredients:

160g Raclette cheese (substitute with Emmental, Appenzeller, Fontina or Gruyère) 80g Montgomery Cheddar

(it does not have to be
Montgomery, unless you
are keen to match the
Wigmore kitchen product
for product; use any strong
mature Cheddar)
80g Ogleshield cheese
(substitute with Taleggio or
Fontina)

20g finely chopped red onion

30g finely chopped cornichon

Dijon mustard 4 slices of sourdough bread Salted butter (the

Wigmore uses clarified butter, but I rather like the caramelisation you get from the dairy solids; you could always use vegetable oil) *Method:*

1. Grate the cheese, and mix thoroughly in a bowl with the finely chopped red onion and cornichon.

2. Spread a thin layer of Dijon mustard on one

internal side of each sandwich.

3. Layer generously with the grated cheese mix, and press down with the second slice of bread. Hilariously, I now appear to be explaining how to use two pieces of bread to make a sandwich..

4. Heat a non-stick or,

better still, a well-seasoned cast iron frying pan over a medium heat and add a good knob of the butter. As it melts swirl it around to cover the base of the frying pan. Add the first sandwich and cook over a medium heat for about 4 minutes. 5. Press it down forcefully into the butter with a spatula every now and then. (The Wigmore uses a sandwich press.) 6. After 4 minutes, carefully turn it over on to the other side. The cheese will have started to melt, bonding it all together. Add another knob of butter, and lift the toastie it has now become so you can swirl the newly molten butter in underneath. Cook for another 4 minutes, again pressing it down

occasionally.
7. Put on a plate or board and leave to cool for a couple of minutes, as you start to cook the second.
At the Wigmore they cut it into 4cm wide slices, which does make it easier to eat.
Crispy duck salad

Ingredients: (Serves 4 as a starter) 2 confit duck legs 4tbsp hoi sin sauce For the salad: 1tbsp sesame seeds 100g watercress or rocket, stalks trimmed (you can also add fresh coriander if you fancy) 6 large radishes, sliced 4 spring onions, trimmed and sliced into batons For the salad dressing: 2tbsp olive oil 1½tbsp sherry vinegar (white wine vinegar is a good alternative) 1tsp sesame oil Sea salt Method:

1. Gently toast the sesame seeds in a dry cast iron frying pan, over a medium heat. Keep watch. They burn easily. When most of them are lightly golden brown, remove to a bowl, add a pinch of table salt, and set aside. Wipe down the pan to remove any stray sesame seeds that are hanging about. They don't taste at all nice when burnt. 2. Separate out the duck legs and place them skin side down in the frying pan over the lowest heat. Do not add any oil. They'll produce more than enough fat of their own. Turn every 5 minutes or so, as they start to colour. 3. After about 10 or 15 minutes, take the pan off the heat. Using a fork and a sharp knife you should be able to pull the meat away

into smaller pieces, with the skin down. Put back on to the heat. Use a spatula to continue breaking up the meat into smaller pieces. Attend to any pieces of skin that come away from the meat. They may look a bit fatty, but gently increase the heat and they will crisp up, though do keep an eye on it all so it doesn't burn.

4. Once crisped, remove the leg bones and keep them as a chef's perk. Stand by the stove, chewing off the last bits of meat while no one else is watching. You've earned it. When the duck is broken up and crisped take the pan off the heat.

5. Put the ingredients for the salad dressing into the bottom of a bowl, including a good pinch of sea salt. Pile the leaves and sliced radishes on top, then toss and turn to coat in the dressing using your hands or, if you're a little uptight, salad servers. Portion out on to four plates or flat bowls.

6. Put the hoi sin sauce in the bottom of a mixing bowl. Add the duck and mix to coat every piece completely. Top each portion of the salad with a quarter of the duck. Sprinkle on the toasted sesame seeds and decorate with the batons of spring onion.

Typically, vaccines help protect us from diseases. But cancer vaccines are different. These are potential therapies to treat people who already have cancer. These treatments have been in development for years, and failures have been frequent, but they are now starting to show promise.

ver the past decade, technological innovations such as genome sequencing have allowed scientists to take a closer look at tumour cells and their genetic abnormalities. This is helping them aim vaccines at much more specific targets. Cancer vaccine research is still in its early phases; however, early results from clinical trials that tested dozens of vaccines against a variety of cancers appear encouraging. The goal is to create vaccines that destroy cancer cells, but some scientists are also testing vaccines that could one day prevent a high-risk individual from developing cancer.

The goal of all vaccines is to "educate" the immune system and give it a preview of a target that needs to be identified and destroyed to keep the body safe. Similarly, a cancer vaccine "teaches" immune cells what a tumour cell "looks like," allowing them to seek out and destroy those cancer cells. A cancer vaccine's ability to teach the immune system is what distinguishes it from other immunotherapies that use therapeutic agents such as protein cytokines and antibodies and include strategies such as genetically modifying a patient's immune cells to fight cancer. Experts say cancer vaccines can potentially destroy cancer cells that might have survived other treatments, stop the tumour from growing or spreading, or prevent the cancer from returning. Some therapeutic cancer

removing immune cells called dendritic cells. These cells are collected from a patient's blood sample and exposed, in the laboratory, to the main proteins extracted from the individual's cancer cells. Once taught, these cells are returned to the patient, with the hope of stimulating and training other immune cells, such as T cells, to detect and destroy the cancer. All vaccines that treat cancer are based on proteins called tumour antigens - a molecule that triggers an immune response when it exists in greater quantity on the surface of cancer cells compared to healthy cells, or when it takes on an abnormal form or has undergone a mutation. When T cells "see" these antigens, they recognise the cells as cancerous and kill



them. Scientists are testing dozens of cancer vaccines, often in conjunction with other immunotherapies. They target different types of cancer, including skin, breast, bladder, prostate, and

An important next step for

scientists is to figure out why some people respond better to vaccines than others and how long they will be protected. Until then, the hope is that more vaccine candidates will advance to randomised clinical trials so that their safety and effectiveness can be

evaluated in a larger number of patients.

Cancer vaccines are still in the early stages of testing and refinement; there is much work to be done, both on the preventative front and on the therapeutic vaccine front, but hope has made progress in this area.

Are Sunday lie-ins good for you?



eople who enjoy a weekend liein could be onto something, as a

new study found those who 'catch up' on lost sleep at weekends may potentially lower their risk of heart disease by up to 20 percent.

Researchers examined data from more than 90,000 people in the UK, which suggested compensating for lack of sleep during the week with some extra time in bed at weekends could help mitigate the negative effects of sleep deprivation. The study, from the National Centre for Cardiovascular Disease at Fuwai Hospital, Beijing, found that sleepdeprived people with the most 'catch-up' sleep at weekends saw their risk of heart disease fall by a fifth, compared to those who had no extra shuteye or slept even less at

weekends. But, we are often told that sticking to regular bedtime and waking routine is key when it comes to optimal sleep. So, is catching up on lost sleep at the weekend good for us after all?

and negatives of lie-Having an extra few hours of slumber at the weekend after a tiring week might help improve your mood.

If consistent sleep isn't possible, a

weekend lie-in may be a good idea.

"Although lie-ins are no substitute for good sleep hygiene, an extra hour or so will do you no harm, and may improve your mood," says Theresa Schnorbach, psychologist and sleep scientist working with Emma – The Sleep Company.

What are the positives

Sleep is also vital for repairing our minds and bodies. "Sleep helps to refresh your body and recover from the day's physical activity," explains Schnorbach. "Sleep also

impacts brain function. "The early stages of sleep are restorative; this is the stage of sleep that helps improve your memory, learning, reaction time and logistical reasoning," she adds. "Sleep deprivation has been found to reduce the sensitivity of receptors and communication between brain regions, ultimately changing the makeup of the brain." People living with chronic health issues may also benefit from getting more sleep when they can – especially during periods of heightened fatigue or stress. The same may be true for new parents, for example, making the most of any opportunity to top up on lost

sleep elsewhere in the week. "Different chronic health issues can impact your rest in different ways," explains Schnorbach. "If you're frequently finding mornings very difficult, are regularly tired during the day, or have any other concerns around your sleep, I would recommend speaking with your doctor.'

Oversleeping can have a negative impact too

However, generally speaking, oversleeping regularly could have negative consequences on our health and wellbeing in the long run too, says Schnorbach.

"Although lie-ins can be beneficial, it's important to watch exactly how much sleep you are getting," she advises. 'If you are sleeping more than nine hours per night, this could be detrimental, as oversleeping is associated with many health problems and can affect concentration and

mood." Irregular sleeping patterns can disturb your body's natural sleep wake cycle. "If you sleep in late, this disrupts your natural sleep cycle and is likely to mean you will have trouble falling asleep if you go to bed at the same time, as usual, that night," explains Dr Deborah Lee, sleep expert working

with Get Laid Beds. "Sleeping in can throw off your body's internal clock, leading to difficulties falling asleep at night.

"Erratic sleep patterns can also wreak havoc on overall health, contributing to anxiety and other health issues."

Why is consistency important for sleep?

Catching up on lost sleep at the weekend may help you feel rejuvenated in the short term – and as the new heart disease study suggests, could benefit your long-term health when you are sleep deprived during the week. But ideally, if possible, many sleep experts believe sticking to a regular sleep routine is helpful overall. "One of the best things you can do for your sleep is keep a regular sleep schedule - even on the weekends," recommends Schnorbach. "By sticking to a routine, your body will learn when sleep is due and prepare itself accordingly by producing the hormones that aid your sleep." Lee adds: "Ideally, we should all be trying to sleep well and get seven hours of good quality sleep every night. It's far better to work on your everyday sleep regime, than to ignore the need for sleep during the week, and only face up to it on the weekends."

When innovation meets safety – a novel approach to facelifts Sara J. Duraes

Innovative facelifts conducted at Up Clinic, through less invasive techniques, have safety, naturalness and quality of the result as their primary priorities.

lastic surgery is a rapidly growing field of medicine. Still, people's top priority remains on safety, so they look for procedures that are as least invasive as possible. As Dr. Tiago Baptista Fernandes, Clinical Director and Plastic Surgeon at Up Clinic shares "I always advise my patients to prioritise safety above everything else, then follows naturalness and finally the aesthetic result". Mainly, younger age groups are extremely careful to make sure they have the fewest visible scars possible, consequently, there has been an urge for plastic surgery to innovate and create mini-invasive procedures, such as endoscopic facelift, that are performed at the facial level with a very low impact of

The endoscopic facelift is distinguished by minimally invasive techniques that hide the procedures' tiny scars on the scalp. "At Up Clinic, when we conduct an endoscopic facelift we use cameras to liberate the tissues so that we can reposition them using different fixation techniques, but we don't stretch the skin as these are outdated techniques," the doctor explained. With endoscopic facelift surgery, you can undergo what is known as outpatient surgery, where you can be discharged on the same day. The patient is either put under general anaesthesia or local anaesthesia along with sedation and remains asleep the entire time. As Dr. Tiago added, "The recuperation period for this kind of surgery is typically one to two weeks, though each patient is unique". As the doctor, who underwent his academic journey at the Hospital St. Maria in Lisbon conducting several placements abroad, mainly in the USA, emphasise, "People are always very cautious about scars when it comes to facial surgery, so it makes sense that there is a range of surgical procedures available, from the least invasive to the most invasive, appropriated for different age gaps, being the endoscopic facelift, one of the less invasive

options". According to Dr. Tiago Baptista Fernandes, "One of the most important areas, especially among the younger population is the periocular region - the area around the eye - as it is the first human contact people have". Therefore, the primary indication for endoscopic facelifts is to fight the ageing of the upper region and the treatment of the eyebrows and upper eyelids. Facial surgical procedures are the third most performed aesthetic treatment worldwide according to ISAPS, with a 19.6 per cent increase in the last year. As Dr. Tiago, the third generation of a family of plastic surgeons' shares, "We want to make people see themselves the same way that they feel about themselves", adding, "As time goes by, and average life expectancy is becoming increasingly higher, people realise that their tissues are ageing while inside they still feel young, and that's when endoscopic facelift becomes a major help". What is cholesterol and how can we By being proactive, you can avoid complications like heart disease or strokes later in life.



oung people may have to start being more mindful about their cholesterol levels after a new study found that exposure to high or fluctuating cholesterol early in life might heighten the risk of atherosclerosis.

Atherosclerosis is the narrowing of the arteries due to a build-up of fatty deposits and can lead to heart disease

and strokes. The study – led by scientists from the University of Cambridge and published in Nature - involved feeding two groups of mice a cholesterolrich diet, either intermittently or continuously. Ziad Mallat, a British Heart Foundation (BHF) professor of cardiovascular medicine at the University of

that an intermittent high-fat diet starting while the mice were still young - one week on, a few weeks off, another week on, and so on - was the worst option in terms of atherosclerosis risk." In addition, other researchers analysed data of 2,000 people from the Cardiovascular Risk in Young Finns Study and found that those who had been

exposed to high cholesterol

levels as children were more likely to have the biggest buildup of plaque in the arteries. But what is cholesterol exactly, and what lifestyle changes can we make to lower it?

What is cholesterol?

"Cholesterol is a fatty substance found in your blood that is essential for building cells and producing certain hormones," explains Dr Oliver Guttmann, a consultant cardiologist at The Wellington Hospital part of HCA Healthcare UK.

The two main types of cholesterol are low-density lipoprotein (LDL) and highdensity lipoprotein (HDL). "LDL is often called 'bad' cholesterol because high levels can lead to plaque build-up in arteries, increasing the risk of heart disease," explains Guttmann. "HDL, on the other hand, is known as 'good' cholesterol because it helps remove LDL from the bloodstream."

Cholesterol levels in the UK are measured in millimoles per litre (mmol/L).

"For most people, a total cholesterol level of 5 or below is considered healthy," says Dr Chun Tang, GP and medical director at Pall Mall Medical. "LDL cholesterol should ideally be less than 4, while HDL should be 1 or above. "Levels above these ranges might be too high and could

put you at risk for health issues, so it's good to keep an eye on them and get further medical tests if you suspect your levels may be too high," adds Tang.

What are the dangers of high cholesterol?

"High cholesterol, especially too much LDL, can lead to fatty deposits in your arteries," explains Tang. "Over time, this build-up can narrow your arteries, making it harder for blood to flow.

"This increases your risk of heart disease, stroke, and other serious health problems," adds Tang. "It's like a traffic jam in your bloodstream, things just can't move along as they should be doing." Certain demographics are more prone to high cholesterol. "Older adults often experience higher cholesterol levels due to ageing and changes in metabolism," says Guttmann. "Genetic factors also play a significant role; conditions like familial hypercholesterolemia cause high cholesterol from a young age.

"Additionally, people with obesity, poor dietary habits, and sedentary lifestyles are more likely to develop high cholesterol."

Why is it important to be mindful of it earlier in life?

"Being mindful of cholesterol levels from an early age is

crucial because it allows for early intervention and lifestyle adjustments that can prevent long-term health issues," highlights Guttmann. Tang agrees and adds: "High cholesterol doesn't usually have symptoms, so it's easy to ignore. By being proactive, you can avoid complications like heart disease or stroke later in life."

So, how can we lower it?

Look at your diet

"Focus on eating more fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and lean proteins," advises Guttmann. "Reduce intake of saturated and trans fats, found in fatty meats, fried foods, and processed snacks. Opt for healthy fats like those in avocados, nuts, and olive oil."

Exercise regularly

"Aim for at least 150 minutes of moderate aerobic activity, such as brisk walking or cycling, each week,' recommends Guttmann. "Regular exercise helps raise HDL cholesterol and lowers LDL cholesterol and triglycerides."

Quit smoking

"Smoking lowers HDL cholesterol and damages blood vessels, so quitting can improve your cholesterol levels and overall heart health," explains Guttmann.



failure to issue residents with new resident cards as they expire.

You'll be aware that the AIMA system is failing and that the government extended the validity of all visas to 30 June 2024. This was shortly followed by an extension until 30 June 2025. The problem for expired residency card holders is that these extensions are only understood by Portuguese authorities.

Residents can not leave Portugal as when returning, the foreign customs will deem that they've overstayed their Schengen visa and have no legal right to return to Portugal. By extending the date until 30 June 2025, the Portuguese government has effectively stopped all expired resident card holders from travelling.

I have friends currently stuck in Ireland as it's outside of the Schengen zone and they can't return. I've heard of travellers being denied travel from Dubai to Portugal as their residency card has expired and the foreign authorities don't recognise the AIMA extension statement.

I think this problem is not yet fully understood and is going to become significant. I'd be interested to see the response to an article on this issue.







Rasmus Neergaard-Petersen earns automatic promotion



he Dane was nine shots off the lead when heading into the weekend at Wittelsbacher Golfclub but he carded a flawless 67 on Moving Day to give himself an outside chance, which he duly took.

He rolled in nine birdies and a solitary bogey in his 64 to set the clubhouse target of 15 under par, with only third-round co-leader Daniel Young on course who could deny the 25-year-old victory.

Young was at the summit alongside Neergaard-Petersen heading down the last, however, a dropped shot saw the Dane earn automatic promotion to the DP World Tour after his third European Challenge Tour title of the campaign.

He becomes the first player since Aaron Rai in 2017 to secure three triumphs in a single campaign.

"Awesome"

"It has been awesome," Neergaard-Petersen said after success in Bavaria. "Before the year I had a goal to see if I could win out here, obviously I had a goal to finish in the top 20, but I could never imagine the way it did. It's

"I think it's been a great stepping ground to learn how to be a professional, I've only been a professional for 14-15 months now so it's still quite new to me but I felt like it's going to help me also looking ahead into the future. "I'm so excited. I've known for a while that I would be playing on the DP World Tour next year, but obviously to see how many events I can get to play before the end of the year. It's just going to be awesome and enjoying myself."

Neergaard-Petersen spent five years at Oklahoma State University during which he finished as runner-up in the 2020 Western Amateur, losing 3&2 to Pierceson Coody who now plys his trade on the PGA TOUR. He helped the International Team win the

2022 Arnold Cup alongside Brazil's Fred Biondi and Swiss Chiara Tamburlini before turning professional in 2023. His maiden success on the European Challenge Tour came at the Kolkata Challenge, where he held his nerve to fend off the challenge of home favourite Rahil Gangjee to win by two strokes in March. The Dane did not wait long for his next win, making it two in three events at the UAE Challenge in April when he came from three shots adrift to claim a one-shot victory ahead of overnight leader Wilco Nienaber. His latest triumph came from even further back as he now embarks on his next adventure on the DP World Tour.


